Learn a Lesson.

Catholics, as well as non-Catholics, can learn a lesson in the following excerpts from a stirring Lincoln's Birthday address in Los Angeles by that splendid Catholic layman of California, Hon. Joseph Scott:-

"The present anti-Catholic campaign, however, has in it some of the lowest forms of suspicion and abuse that ever confronted a religious body in the history of humanity. Men and even women have been going through this country on lecture platforms, and through public prints, with a campaign of vilification of the manhood and womanhood of the Catholic Church which would resurrect even the dead to righteous indignation. We Catholic men are just like the rest of you, with a limit of human patience and with hearts in our bosoms that feel insult and slander just as it would affect you. For centuries we have been taught to respect our mothers, our wives, our sisters, and our daughters as exemplars of purity and virtue, and if, therefore, the mails are filled with literature unfit to be read by decent people, it is hardly to be wondered at if in certain places impulsive men have resented insult to their women in a manner not warranted by law.

"Needless to say, of course, we aim at inculcating in our members strict obedience to the law, in spite of the provocation to which they are being subjected.

We Catholic Americans owe no political allegiance to the Pope. He has no civil power whatever over our activities.

"So long as religious liberty is practiced under the spirit of the constitution the Catholic would be the veriest ingrate who would not give his whole-hearted allegiance to this country. If we only look abroad, therefore, for the illustration to which I refer we will see Catholics of every country in Europe dying by the thousands for the flag of their nation."

"We, as Americans, need have no anxiety about the deadly parallel when it comes to this embodiment of this American ideal, but we can put down the pages of history of other worthy governments and by comparison with rulers in other lands and other times, the immortal name of Lincoln will never suffer. May peace rest upon his noble soul, and glory immortal to his memory."

If they have fallen down at such a critical moment, what becomes of this boasted efficiency?

Is it because so much time and energy is spent in checking up the so-called efficiency systems, that insufficient time is left to become really efficient in operating railroads? Or is it due to a lack of foresight in relegating to the rear the trained and trusted operatives of ye olden days to give place to the "four flushers" and promiscuous mongers who are long on talk and short on fulfillment? What ever the cause there should be a remedy.

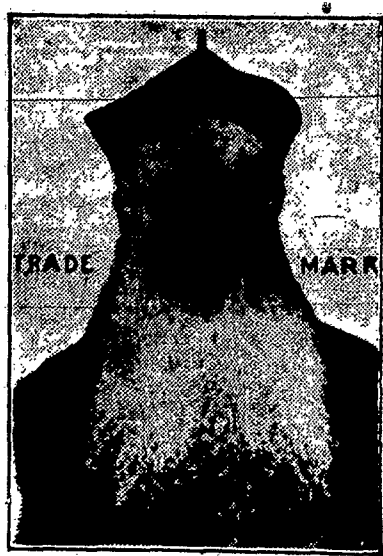
