**St. Mary's Church.**

The masses on Sunday will be as follows: 6, 7, 8:30, 9:30 and 10:45 o'clock. Sunday school and vespers at the usual hour.

The Rosary Society will receive Holy Communion in a body at the 7 o'clock mass Sunday morning.

Lenten services will be held at 7:45 o'clock on Wednesday and Friday evenings.

The funeral of Stephen J. Farrell, aged 43 years, of 578 South Avenue, a prominent letter carrier, who died at his home Friday morning, February 23rd, was held on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock from the house and at 10:30 from this church. Father Fitzsimons celebrated requiem high mass. The bearers were: Emmet K. Courneen, John P. Brennan, Joseph C. Landon, Joseph B. Martin, Lawrence F. Waldert and Patrick H. Gildan. The mass was sung by Misses Margaret Heveron and Blanche Drury and Messrs. Kinney, Dickman, Horan, Hall and Boucher. The church was crowded with friends.

Postmaster William A. Buckley and assistant Postmaster Charles J. Fleckenstein headed the procession of 35 carriers. Behind the carriers were Assistant Superintendent of Mails, Joseph J. Vick and 21 clerks. There were many beautiful floral pieces. He leaves his mother, Mary B. Farrell; two sisters, Mrs. Edward Kelly and Anna Elizabeth Farrell; two brothers, Thomas of Philadelphia and Lawrence of East Rochester.

"Electricity and How It is Distributed", will be the subject of the lecture to be given Sunday afternoon, March 4th, before the "Every Sunday Educational Meeting" of the Young Men's Association. This lecture will be illustrated and will be given by one of the engineers of the Rochester Railway & Light Co. These lectures have proven to be very popular with the young men of St. Mary's Club and will probably be one of the main features of its winter activities. On Sunday, March 11th, the Club will listen to Mr. A. A. Rutan, Superintendent of the Premo Works of the Eastman Kodak Co. These talks will start promptly at 4 o'clock.

The annual election of the Club will take place the second Monday of this month. A nomination committee consisting of James H. Farrell, Joseph P. Roth, Hugh Cullen, John A. Kavanaugh and Harry McGinnis have been appointed and will post a list of nominations in a few days.

Commencing Sunday, March 18th, 1917, a mission will be conducted at this church by the Carmelite Fathers. During the mission, books of Instruction and Devotions, Beads, Crucifixes, Scapulars, etc., may be procured. All are earnestly requested to read the little pamphlet distributed last Sunday entitled: "How to Make the Mission." A careful study of this little pamphlet helps us to know ourselves and to make known the state of our souls to the confessor in the Sacred Tribunal of Penance. The blessing of articles every evening, except Monday after Benediction and every morning, except Monday after the 8 o'clock mass. The mission will continue for two weeks, the first week for the women and the second week for the men. Both men and women, however, may attend the morning exercises. On week days the first mission mass will be at 5 o'clock and the second at 8 o'clock. On week days there will be short instructions after the 5 o'clock mass and a sermon after the 8 o'clock mass. Rosary, instructions, sermon and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament in the evening at 7:30 o'clock. There will be no sermon on Saturday evening. Exposition and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament from 7:30 to 8:30 o'clock on Saturday evening, closing with Benediction. The masses on Sunday during the mission will be held at the usual time. Confessions will begin on Tuesday evening of each week at the following hours: in the morning after the 8 o'clock mass; from 3:30 to 6 p. m., and from 7:30 to 10 P. M.
