City Parish News

Interesting Budget of Happenings Gathered by Our City Reporter

St. Mary's Church.

The masses on Sunday will be as follows: 6, 7, 8:30, 9:30 and 10:45 o'clock.

The monthly school collection will be taken up at all the masses on Sunday.

The Confraternity of Mary will receive Holy Communion in a body at the 7 o'clock mass Sunday morning.

Beginning on Sunday morning, March 18th, the Carmelite Fathers will conduct a two week's mission at this church, during which books of instruction and Devotions, Beads, Crucifixes, Scapulars, etc., may be procured. Articles will be blessed every evening, except Monday, after Benediction, and every morning, except Monday, after the 8 o'clock mass. The first week will be for the women and the second week for the men. Both men and women, however, may attend the morning exercises. On week days the first mission mass will be at 5 o'clock and the second at 8 o'clock. On week days there will be short instructions after the 5 o'clock mass and a sermon after the 8 o'clock mass. Rosary, Instructions, sermon and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament in the evening at 8:30 o'clock. There will be no sermon on Saturday evening, but exposition and adoration of the Blessed Sacrament from 7:30 to 8:30 o'clock will be held, closing with Benediction. The masses on Sunday during the mission will be held at the usual time. Confessions will begin on Tuesday evening of each week at the following hours: In the morning after the 8 o'clock mass; in the afternoon from 3:30 to 6 P. M.; and in the evening from 7:30 to 10 P. M.
