KNIGHTS WILL ESCORT BISHOP TO CEMETERY

The annual ceremonial for the deceased members of the Knights of St. John will be in the form of a field mass at Holy Sepulchre cemetery on Sunday, June 17th, at 10 o'clock. The mass will be a pontifical memorial mass and will be sung by Bishop Thomas F. Hickey, assisted and attended by a large number of the clergy of the diocese.
