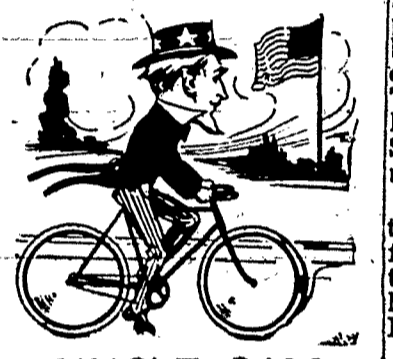

And also in connection with the celebration was the singing of the first mass by Rev. Geo. M. Kalb, a member of one of the best known families of this parish and a graduate of this school

who was ordained to the priesthood last Saturday morning. Large numbers of relatives and friends occupied the center aisles and the event was one of the most solemn and impressive services witnessed in the church. Another feature of the day was the celebration of St. Boniface day, which according to the annual custom, the members of the St. Boniface Commandery, Knights of St. John attend high mass in a body in full uniform and receive Holy Communion in a body at the early mass. Father Kalb was honored before the mass by the above Commandery headed by a 12 piece band and escorted the young Levite from the home of his parents Mr. and Mrs. Robert G. Kalb, 143 Benton St., to the church. Assisting Father Kalb in the celebrating of the mass were Rev. John F. Boppel, rector, who was assistant priest; Rev. Raymond Lawrence of Syracuse, who was also ordained last week acted as deacon and George W. Weidman of this city, a student of St. Bernard's was master of ceremonies. A very excellent and fitting sermon was delivered by Rev. Edw. Bayer, in which he congratulated both the family of Father Kalb and the members of this church on the ordination of the young man to the priesthood. In the procession in which Father Kalb, took part were also his sister, Catherine Kalb, who carried the pillow upon which the young priest knelt at parts of the mass and accompanying her were Anna Ritz his niece and Alberta Ritz his cousin.

Following the mass and procession, the Knights gave an exhibition drill and fancy marching formations before a large and appreciative crowd that assembled despite the rainy and wet weather. Dinner was served in the parish hall to about eighty relatives of Father Kalb and in the afternoon there was a reception to his many friends in the hall.

Another event that attracted the attention on last Sunday was when the members of the St. Boniface Young Men's Club showed their patriotism by raising a large American flag over their clubhouse. The Knights of St. John, under the gallant leadership of Captain August Golbach assisted at the flag raising and when Old Glory was raised, the band struck up the tune of the hour—the National Emblem march. The flag was purchased through the liberal contributions of the members of the Club. Father Boppel can well be proud of the memorable events that took place on last Sunday at this church.
