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
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City Parish News

"Hiawatha" at Sea Breeze
Hiawatha as acted by Indians at Sea Breeze has completely won the interest and approval of discerning people. The unusual way in which the familiar story of Longfellow is set forth and the great beauty of the location chosen for the performance is sure to make it a substantial success before Hiawatha leaves Rochester.

The spot where the adventure of Hiawatha and Minnehaha are acted is to the south of the park in a secluded glen far away from any disturbing influence to mar the poetry of the performance. The entrance to the play is beyond the dancing pavilion to the right as one leaves the street car exit. Full advantage has been taken of the natural beauties of the spot and an ideal woodland theatre is the result, with excellent seating arrangements where everyone has an uninterrupted view of the entire proceedings.

What is more the reader of the poem who follows the action of the play with the lines of Longfellow has a voice which carries to the farthest corner of the amphitheatre and is full, rich and dramatic in its expression.

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
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
