Publicity Needed.

Why is it that the newspapers are printing such misinformation that the Y. M. C. A. is the only agency authorized by President Wilson to conduct moral work in France?

The reason why the Y. M. C. A. is so heralded is that the Y. M. C. A. has a clever publicity bureau in charge of a trained newspaper man and he sends his publicity matter to the press in the shape of cleverly written news articles.

The point we wish to make is that the Knights of Columbus receives the credit to which it is entitled and to do this it should have its own publicity bureau in order that the Catholic public which is helping to furnish the proposed three million dollar fund may be informed as to its disposition.

Brief mention in Catholic papers will not suffice in this instance. The daily press should carry this news just as it carries the publicity matter of the Y. M. C. A. If the K. of C. matter is furnished to but not used by the daily press then we would have cause to complain.

We Catholics should not hesitate to employ the recognized vehicles of legitimate publicity. Have you contributed to the special three million dollar fund being raised by the Catholic War Council?

"Come Back To Erin" at the Avon Theater.

Next week will see the re-opening of the Avon Theater in this city with an Irish play that will serve to bring to Rochester for the first time the one and only Irish born comedian at present on the American stage, in the person of Mr. Walter Lawrence, and while Mr. Lawrence is one of the younger generation, all good Irishmen in America will welcome him as the first comedian of his type since the days of Wm. J. Scanlan.

The play tells a story of a young Irish-American, Dan McGuire, brought to this country by his parents who left the old sod to avoid the wrath of his father's people, incurred by his father's marriage. Left alone here through the death of his parents, the boy seeks out friends of his people, whom he had known in Ireland, and although the wealthy John Donnell receives him with disfavor, Kathleen, only daughter of the house of Donnell, looks on him with anything but disfavor, and persuades her father to make a place for him.

All goes well until the death of Donnell when Dan finds himself in love with Kathleen, determines to go West and win his fortune before asking her the all important question. In the West he wins out and returns to make her his wife only to find that his cousin, coveting the title Earl of Dunmore, to which Dan is rightfully heir, has been casting doubt on his parentage and spreading broadcast a statement to the effect that the marriage of his father and mother, over which the family row that drove him from Ireland took place, had never been solemnized.

In proving the falseness of this statement, Dan returns to Ireland and with him go Kathleen and her brother and other characters in the play. The last act takes place in beautiful Dunmore and is staged in a manner that will make every Irishman imagine he can smell the peach smoke and see in fancy the rolling verdant hills of the little green Isle.

Opening Concert at Convention Hall to Be Given by Julia Culp, Lieder Singer.

The twenty-eighth season of the Tuesday Musicals will open on October 12th, with a recital at Convention Hall given by Julia Culp, the distinguished Dutch lieder singer. In addition to the appearance of Julia Culp there will be two other evening concerts at Convention Hall one by the famous Philadelphia Orchestra, Leopold Stokowsky conducting, with Jacques Thibaud, the greatest of all French violinists, as soloist, and one on April 3d by Harold Bauer, pianist.

Besides the evening series there will be six morning recitals, of exceptional artistic interest, the performers including Marie Sundelius, one of the leading sopranos of the Metropolitan Opera Company; Guiomar Novaes, the brilliant young Brazilian pianist; Greta Torpadie, one of the most successful of the younger sopranos; Misha Levitski, the young Russian pianist who was one of the sensations of the past season in New York, and the Fleonzaley quartette, the foremost exponents of chamber music in this country.
