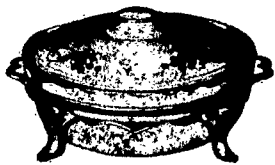

His Eminence James Cardinal Gibbons  
Dean of the American College of Cardinals  
Baltimore, Md.

His Eminence James  
Cardinal Gibbons

Gibbons of Baltimore, typical churchman and typical American, by many persons throughout the land, considered the greatest living American. Reverenced for his gracious character and true Americanism. Certainly, is it that few, if any, hold a higher place in the affections and esteem of the more than ninety million of our citizens without distinction of race, creed or party affiliations. He is one of the most unassuming of men, a sincere democrat in the best sense of that much abused term.

James Gibbons, the second American Cardinal, was born in Baltimore City July 23, 1834.

At an early age young Gibbons was taken by his parents to Ireland, the home of his ancestors, and there he received the rudiment of his training. At the age of twenty-seven years he received the lot of Holy Orders, June 30, 1861.

He was consecrated a Bishop on the 16th of August, 1868, and on May 20, 1877, Bishop Gibbons was appointed coadjutor with the right of succession to the Most Rev. James Roosevelt Bayley, Archbishop of Baltimore. Archbishop Bayley passed to his reward October 3, 1877, and Bishop Gibbons succeeded to the responsibilities of the first archdiocese in America. In February of 1888, he was solemnly invested with the pallium, the insignia of the Archbishopial dignity in his Cathedral seat at Baltimore.

In 1883 Archbishop Gibbons was summoned to Rome to confer with Pope Leo on affairs relating to the welfare of the church in the United States, and was appointed by the Holy Father to preside over the third Plenary Council of Baltimore, convened in the following year.

This was the most notable gathering of Prelates and divines ever held in America, and was in session in the Baltimore Cathedral from November 9 to December 7, 1884. The wealth of intellect, splendor of rank and halo of ecclesiastical achievement combined to make the assemblage forever notable in American records of matter and of church and at this meeting the executive ability of the most youthful prelate that the See of Baltimore had known was exhibited clearly, winning for him the unexpected admiration of the assembled theologians.

Prior to the Third Plenary Council of Baltimore, the United States, in the eyes of Rome, was still a missionary country, subject to the jurisdiction of the Propaganda. Consequently at this meeting many questions of a highly important character were discussed, all which dealt with the religious welfare of the American people.

The acts and decrees of this Plenary Council were approved by the Pope, who shortly afterwards, as a mark of his favored approbation, raised Archbishop Gibbons to the Cardinalatial dignity.

Archbishop Gibbons was created a Cardinal at a Consistory held in Rome, June 7, 1886. Twenty-three days later, June 30, the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination to the Holy Priesthood occurred the formal investiture with the rank and insignia of a member of the sacred college.

The ceremony was performed in the historic Baltimore Cathedral, the hallowed walls of which had witnessed every form of ceremony with which the church performs her divine functions of the ministry, and confers the ranks and obligations which pertain to their exercise, and now view for the first time the solemn ceremonies which make a son of the church, a prince in her great establishment.

Cardinal Gibbons received the "red hat" March 17, 1887, which marked the completion of his dignity.

Few men have accomplished as much in the brief sphere of existence as such as has Cardinal Gibbons. The church would have gone on in the United States without him as regards its temporal prosperity, but the present favored position of the church in this country, the splendid regard in which it is held by all classes of believers and unbelievers is as much due to the nobility of character and to the lofty, enlightened and inspiring personality of Cardinal Gibbons as is the power and the glory of the church at large due to the presence of these same qualities in the late illustrious occupant of Peter's Chair, Leo XIII.

Of him, Most Rev. John Ireland, Archbishop of St. Paul, Minn., said while delivering his most famous pulpit oration, "Church and Age," in the Baltimore Cathedral, "The name of Gibbons lights up the page of nearly every European book which treats of modern social and political questions. The ripples of Cardinal Gibbons' influence cross the threshold of the Vatican." Cardinal Gibbons has been to the American church what Manning was to the church in England, a light that warmed while it illumined.

He had been termed by that great pulpit orator Ireland as the "providential Archbishop of Baltimore." Again the dying Archbishop Ryan, whose rich and powerful voice often had been heard on occasions big with the importance of the church in America, now reduced to a whisper, as His Eminence entered the sick room, said: "I know every tone of your Eminence's voice and now as ever I am convinced that you are the instrument of Providence for every good thing for our church and country."

Cardinal Gibbons in the busiest portions of his life has been able to produce three world famed books, "The Faith of Our Fathers," "Our Christian Heritage," and "Ambassadors of Christ." Of the former, 650,000 English copies have already been published.

The oldest living member of the Sacred College, as the Cardinals who comprise that body are known, is called the dean. At present that honor belongs to Cardinal Gibbons, through the death of the beloved Cardinal Oreglia, who was the last surviving cardinal created by Pope Pius IX.

When a cardinalatial office is vacant the cardinal next in rank of seniority can choose the vacant office, thus the oldest of the cardinals becomes the Dean of the college, at the same time the Bishop of Ostia, for according to ancient custom the Dean of the Sacred College is always the Bishop of Ostia.

It is that illustrious body of churchmen who assemble in Rome after the death of a Pope, who elect and create another of their number to become a Hermit of the Vatican.
