Protectographs are manufactured for almost every country under the sun, with special dials to conform to the monetary standard of each country. For example, the machines shipped to Great Britain and British possessions, write the words "Pounds, Shillings, Pence," etc.; Chinese machines write "Tael" and "Candareens"; Japanese, "Yen" and "Sen"; West Indian, "Bolivares" and "Centimes"; Swedish, "Kronor" and

"Ore"; East Indian, "Rupees," "Annas" and "Pais," etc. There are also machines especially for protecting grain receipts, bills of lading, stock certificates, etc.

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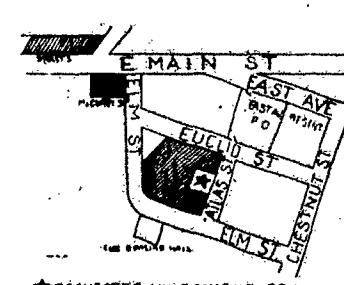
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
