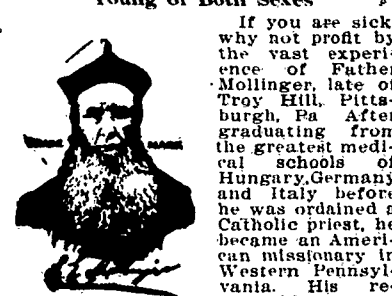

Lawrence Jung, a professor at St. Mary's College, Northeast, Pa., were with him during the time his condition was considered serious.

Father Jung came to this city about two years ago and his interest in the welfare of his parish made him one of the most popular priests in the diocese.

He was born in Baltimore, Md., July 15, 1866, and received his early education in the parochial schools of that city. He was graduated from the Redemptorist College at Ilchester, Md., and later was transferred to St. Mary's College, where he completed his classical course.

Continuing his studies, he returned to Ilchester for his seminary education and was ordained a priest at the college in April, 1891. At various times he was stationed at St. James' Church, Baltimore; St. Boniface's Church, Philadelphia; Church of the Immaculate Conception, Melrose, N. Y., and the Mission Church in Fifty-ninth Street, Brooklyn.
