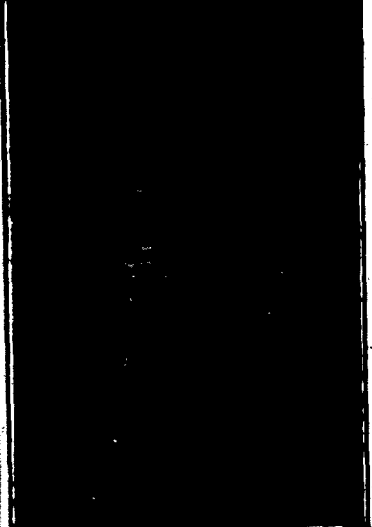
### C. R. AND B. A.
