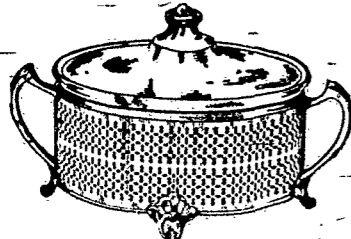

St. Peter and Paul.

The masses on Sunday will be 6:30, 8:15, 9:30 and high mass at 10:45 o'clock.

The solemn closing of the Forty Hour devotion were held last Sunday evening. The procession was composed of the school children, officers of the various societies, eighteen priests and twenty-four altar boys, with Commandery No. 23, Knights of St. John as escorts. Rev. M. Hargather of St. Michael's church carried the Blessed Sacrament. The choir rendered a new Tantum Ergo, and the entire congregation joined in singing Holy God.

Rt. Rev. Bishop Hickey will administer the sacrament of confirmation in this church on next Sunday afternoon at 4 p. m. A large number of adults will be confirmed, the result of the mission.

Midnight mass will be celebrated on Christmas eve and tickets may be procured at the pew rent office, after the masses on Sunday.

Cathedral.

Monday, Dec. 24th, is the vigil of Christmas and will be observed as a day of fasting and abstinence. Confessions will be heard at the usual hours.

The church will be closed on Monday evening at 10 o'clock and will reopen at 11:30 for the midnight mass. At 12 o'clock solemn high mass commonly known as midnight mass will be celebrated.

The Gregorian music at the midnight mass will be sung by ninety students of St. Andrew's Seminary, with N. Margrett as first chanter.

The morning masses of Christmas day will be at the usual hours: 6:00, 7:30, 8:30, 9:30 and 10:30 o'clock.

The 10:30 o'clock mass will be a solemn pontifical mass celebrated by Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D.D., assisted by the priests of the Seminary and Cathedral. Rev. M. J. Nolan, D.D., will preach the sermon of the day. At the close of the mass Bishop Hickey will impart the Papal blessing.

The music will be sung by the entire choir of students of both seminaries and the Cathedral boys' and mens' choir, making a chorus of about 350 voices. Vespers and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will be held at 3:30 p.m.
