St. Pius Church of Cohocton

is Destroyed By Flames.

Cohocton, Jan. 16.—St. Pius Church, in this village and its entire furnishings were entirely destroyed by fire last Sunday afternoon, and the home of Rev. J. Gefell, with much of its furnishings, so damaged by fire and water as to be almost a total loss.

The fire broke out in the north end of the building some distance from the furnace and spread so rapidly to the front that nothing could be done to stay its progress, as the fire department was greatly hindered by snow and a strong gale which was blowing from the northwest.

The building was the largest church edifice in the town of Cohocton and its value was probably not far from \$7,500, and the residence had been but recently repaired and furnished at an expense of nearly \$1,200. The insurance probably will not cover more than half the loss. Rev. Gefell had been absent since Sunday. How the fire started is a mystery, as when the housekeeper first discovered it, the entire back part seemed all ablaze. The building erected for school purposes and the garage caught fire, but were prevented from burning.
