Cathedral.

The feast of St. Patrick will be commemorated on Monday, March 18th, on account of the feast falling on Sunday. Rev. Father Cameron will preach the sermon at the 10:30 mass.

A novena to St. Joseph began Sunday, March 10th. Special services will be held until the feast of St. Joseph, which is next Tuesday.

The retreat at the Cathedral will be held during Passion week from March 17th to 24th. It will be conducted by Rev. J. M. Eckert, a Dominican Father.

REV. J. A. HICKEY DIES.

Former Pastor of Holy Apostles Church Dies in San Francisco.

Rev. James A. Hickey, formerly pastor of Holy Apostles' Church in this city, died on Tuesday, March 12th, in San Francisco where he had gone for his health. Father Hickey was made rector of Holy Apostles' Church in 1900, and retired in 1910. He leaves two sisters, Miss Mary Hickey, of No. 588 Plymouth avenue, and Mrs. Nellie Managh, of Woodport; a brother, Michael Hickey of Woodport, and a niece, Miss Mary Cloppin, of this city.

He was a member of the Knights of Columbus. Arrangements are being made to have his body brought to Rochester for interment in Holy Sepulcher cemetery.

BISHOP HICKEY TRANSFERS PRIESTS IN DIOCESE.

Bishop Thomas F. Hickey has announced the transfers of a number of assistant priests in the diocese. The changes are to go into effect at once.

Rev. John M. Ball, for the past three years assistant at the Cathedral and teacher in the Catholic High School, has been appointed assistant to Rev. William F. Payne, at St. Mary's Church, Auburn, in place of Rev. Arthur LeMay, who has been appointed to a chaplaincy in the army. Rev. Leo V. Smith has been transferred from the Blessed Sacrament Church, this city, to Immaculate Conception Church, Ithaca, where he will be assistant to Rev. William Harrington, in place of Rev. M. Sellinger, who also has been made a chaplain in the army.

Rev. William J. Killacky, who has been chaplain at St. Ann's and has conducted funeral services at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, will succeed Rev. Father Smith as assistant at Blessed Sacrament Church. Rev. Father Killacky, who has been in ill health and has been at the seminary to recuperate, is now well and able to undertake the duties of curate in a city parish.

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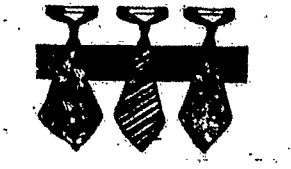
