CHURCH INSIDE DECORATED

The interior of St. Boniface Church, this city, has been redecorated at the cost of about \$8,000. The decorations are in Gothic style of the thirteenth century and include fifty-two angel figures, forty-two being painted in the nave above the arcade arches and the other ten above the sanctuary. The predominant colors are ivory, green and gold flat oil colors being utilized.

All the statues in the church have been repainted and redecorated. A new statue of St. Ann, a gift of Mrs. George Kalb, has been placed on one side of the sanctuary. The walls in the vestibule of the church and the woodwork of the church have been redecorated and varnished. Rev. John F. Boppel is rector of the church.
