U-BOAT IS SUNK BY ITS OWN MINE

Tragedy of Hun Submarine Recorded in British Cemetery.

ONLY ONE OF CREW RESCUED

Sole Survivor Tells of Disaster on Craft While on Mine-Laying Expedition Along the Coast of England—Prisoner Nearly Paralyzed With Fright Expects Instant Death When He Recognizes Rescuers.

In a small seacoast village cemetery within a day's travel of London there are seventeen graves side by side where British sailors some time ago buried seventeen German sailors all but one of a U-boat which was sunk by one of its own mines just outside the village. Publication of the story, without mention of place names and some other details, is now permitted.

The population of the village was awakened at half-past ten o'clock one night by a terrific explosion on the water front. A few moments later by a second explosion. The villagers ran down to the beach, but the lifeboat could not be used because there was no one on hand who could run the engine. Two oared lifeboats were dragged from storage in a nearby shed and manned by boys and old men.

One of Crew Rescued. No ship was in sight, nor was there any further sound to guide the rescue party. Nevertheless the boats put out into the black night and presently one of them returned with one rescued man, almost completely exhausted. The man was carried to the nearest house, dazed, shivering and nearly paralyzed with fright. He had lost the uniforms worn by the crew and coast guards. He had been in the water for several hours and had been nearly dead. In answer to the question as to how he was rescued, he said that he was lying on the deck of the lifeboat when it was struck by the mine and that he was the only one who survived.

Submarine Blown in Two. All the lights were extinguished by the explosion and almost immediately afterward one of the mines left in the boat let go. The captain, still uninjured, managed to get through the hatch and into the water. The sub-

marine was blown in two. The prisoner was visibly anxious about the loss of his boots. These were recovered eventually from the water and a number of confidential papers were found stitched inside the lining.

The submarine was raised and towed into port. The hull contained 17 dead Germans and several live mines, one of which is on exhibition at the village pier as a trophy. The wreck of the submarine has been inspected by a number of visitors in the other commanding the American naval station.

BACKYARD POULTRY GROWING

The city or town man who keeps a small flock of hens not only is saving money but is helping his country. Every pound of poultry raised and every egg laid releases just so much pork and beef for our armies and allies according to L. W. Burby, poultry husbandman stationed at the agricultural college by the United States department of agriculture.

Poultry will not prevent one's growing a garden. Twelve hens confined in a pen big enough for exercise and provided with green food will furnish a goodly number of eggs for food. A packing box and a little poultry netting are all that is necessary for building a house and run.

For egg production a rooster should not be kept as he is noisy and has a large appetite, but has no influence on the number of eggs produced.

The poultry grower should not depend too much on table scraps for feeding his poultry, points out Mr. Burby. Enough feed should be given to keep the birds in good condition and sufficient excess to produce eggs. The hens will eat vegetable peelings and fruit scraps if these are put through the food chopper and mixed with a little mash. A good mixed ration of four parts of bran, two parts of shorts, and one part of high grade feed scraps, by weight.

Plenty of green feed should be used. This cuts down the amount of grain necessary. It is desirable to feed to the poultry the green weeds and thinning from the garden, also the misshapen and wormy vegetables, and tough corn, unfit for human consumption.

Potato Menus Provide for Breakfast, Dinner, Supper

WHAT YOUR BOND PURCHASE WILL ACCOMPLISH.

The following figures give one a definite idea of what his or her loan to the government by the purchase of Liberty Bonds will accomplish when used by the war department.

One \$50 bond will buy trench knives for a rifle company, or 23 hand grenades, or 14 rifle grenades, or 37 cases of surgical instruments for enlisted men's belts, or 10 cases of surgical instruments for officers' belts.

A \$100 bond will clothe a soldier, or feed a soldier for eight months, or purchase 5 rifles, or 30 rifle grenades, or 43 hand grenades, or 25 pounds of other, or 145 hot water bags, or 2,000 surgical needles.

A \$100 and a \$50 bond will clothe and equip an infantry soldier for service overseas, or feed a soldier for a year.

Two \$100 bonds will purchase a horse or mule for cavalry or artillery or other service.

Three \$100 bonds will clothe a soldier and feed him for one year in France, or buy a motor cycle for a machine gun company.

Four \$100 bonds will buy an X-ray outfit.

One \$50 bond will supply the cycles for the headquarters company of an infantry regiment.
