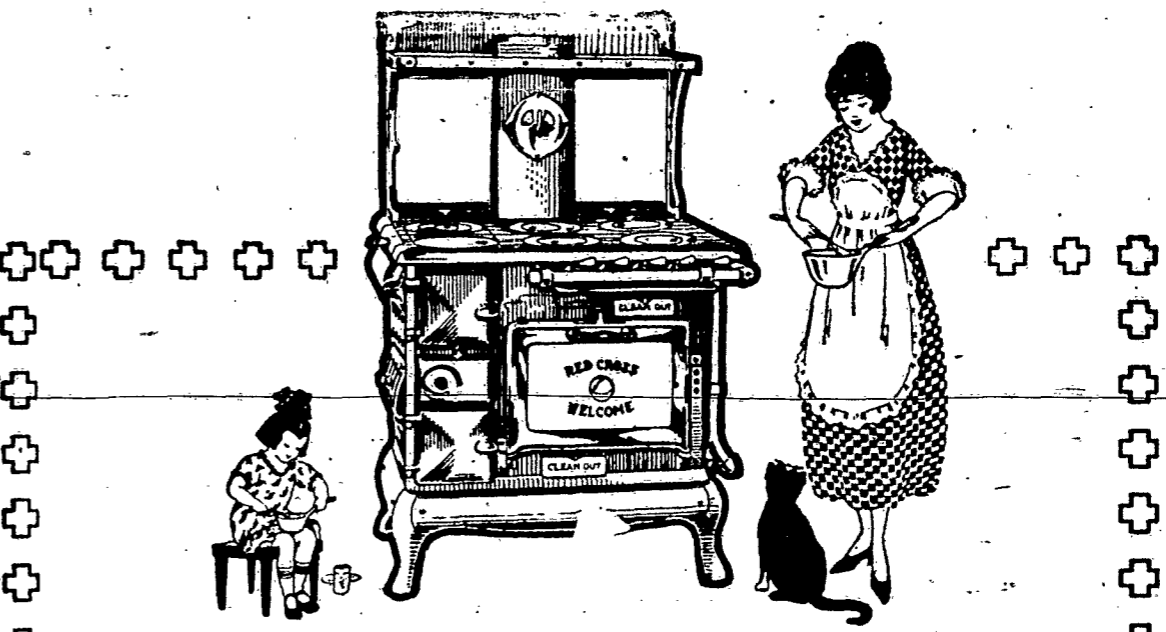

It amounted to \$2,208,378, according to the annual report of the fisheries branch, issued recently. This was \$334,760 greater than the value for the previous year.

Glass for Spectacles
