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Opening of Ontario Beach Park.

Ontario Beach Park's gates will swing open Saturday morning, May 25th. On Monday, May 27th, will commence the bill of free attractions on the elevated stage, and these have been selected with considerable care for Memorial Day week. Included in the list of features for this week is a quartette of aerialists, the Four Flying DuValls, a European troupe whose sensational exploits in casting feats have placed them in the front rank of this class of performers. Another bidder for the favor of the Memorial Day week visitors is a performer who twice daily hurls himself from a height of 104 feet into a scant five and one-half feet of water. Alfred Monk's Beach Park Band will give daily concerts throughout the week with a special program for Memorial Day. Outdoor motion pictures to be projected especially constructed before the big platform, will also be prominently featured.

In readiness for that part of its patronage who in the past have shown a fondness for the thrills of the whizzing rides, are the "Breezer," the Old Mill, the Giant Merry-Go-Round, the Flying Airships, the Foolish House, and that attraction, the fame of which has extended far beyond the confines of Rochester, Hilarity Hall. Added to these for the approaching term is the Whip, the Ferris Wheel, and the Mechanical Wonder. Under the management of William Muntz, the Hotel Ontario will be conducted.

Since the taking in of Ontario Beach Park by the City of Rochester, the plans upon which the pleasure place has been operated has been such as to create a standard for the conduct of like enterprises throughout the country. This, in a measure, has been made possible by the grounds at all times being under the supervision of Rochester's police department; the order and decorum maintained being the subject of generally favorable comment. It is the object of the management for the coming year to even more firmly establish this condition, to the end that women and children may visit that stretch of Lake Ontario's shore within the park's boundaries, in the confidence that no untoward incident will be permitted to mar their day of outdoor joy seeking.

On Sunday will begin the beach concerts with Margaret Heveron as soprano-soloist; Charles D. Vickers, tenor-soloist and a special program by Alfred Monk's Band.
