The bearers were Beekman C. Little, superintendent of waterworks; George Herzberger, Fred Madden, Thomas Lynch, Charles Keogh and Arthur O'Leary of the Department of Public Works.

Blessed Sacrament.

Rev. Thomas F. Connors, rector of Blessed Sacrament Church in Oxford Street, observed the twentieth anniversary of his ordination Wednesday, June 12th. Father Connors celebrated high mass at 8:30 o'clock.
