MAKE PEANUT FLOUR BREAD

Florida Baker Expects to Market It
at Price Below That of
Wheat Flour.

Washington.—Peanut flour bread
has been put on the market in wide
distribution by a baking company in
Gainesville, Fla., working in co-opera-
tion with B. F. Williamson, a chemist
of that city, the food administration
reports.

The peanut flour used is made from
peanut cake left after oil extraction.
It is said to contain a satisfactory
percentage of fat and to have almost
twice the nitrogenous food value of
dried beef, in the ratio of 44 to 25.

The loaf is made of one-fifth peanut
flour to four-fifths wheat flour, which
produces a balanced ration, supplying
both bread and meat ingredients.

Peanut flour is said to be readily
digestible, wholesome and palatable,
and the Florida company expects to
be able to market it at a price below
that of wheat flour.
