REV. ARTHUR A. LEMAY AGAIN AT BATTLE FRONT.

Mrs. L. N. LeMay has received word that her son, Rev. Arthur A. LeMay, has arrived overseas. Father LeMay was stationed at St. Mary's Church, Auburn, N. Y., before he made his first trip to Europe in February of this year. On the way over he was injured, but he continued to perform his duties until he was ordered to return to the United States for medical treatment. He arrived in New York in the latter part of May, and after a short stay there he went to Plattsburgh, N. Y. He remained at Plattsburgh a few weeks and then came to his mother's home, No. 72 Savannah street. There he stayed for a few weeks. He had a prolonged sick leave, but as his condition improved rapidly he wired the authorities in Washington for permission to return to his duties.
Washington sent Father LeMay to Plattsburgh as post chaplain. He was there only a short time when he desired to go back to the battlefront. Washington listened to his request and gave him a commission for overseas. He sailed on July 25th for Europe, and a telegram came to his mother on August 12th that he had arrived safely.
Father LeMay during his stay at his mother's home told of the remarkable effect the American soldiers are having on the people of France. He said that the soldiers are happy and enthusiastic over their work, as they feel their country is doing everything possible to make army life pleasant for them.
