Funeral Held Thursday Morning Is Largely Attended

Death claimed Angelo J. Newman, aged 35 years, Monday afternoon, Oct. 7th, 1918, at the family home, No. 99 Milbank St. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Theresa M. Newman; one sister, Eleanor A., and one brother, Leon A. Newman; an aunt, Miss Elizabeth Dissette; an uncle, Thomas Dissette, all of this city. Deceased was a member of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus, Fourth Degree Assembly, Musa Caravan, Order of Alhambra, Catholic Actors' Guild.

The funeral took place Thursday morning, Oct. 10th, 1918, at 9:30 o'clock from the home and 10 o'clock at St. Monica's Church. Rev. Robert Henry, of the Cathedral, was celebrant assisted by Rev. Andrew Disset of Clyde, a deacon, and Rev. Joseph Disset of Elmira, as subdeacon; the master of ceremonies was Rev. F. T. Moffett, of St. Monica's Church. About forty priests of the diocese were in the sanctuary.

Soldiers from the School of Aerial Photography were at the services and headed by the band, escorted the body to Holy Sepulchre cemetery, where burial was made. Delegations from Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus, from the Fourth Degree Assembly and from Musa Caravan, Order of the Alhambra, were present.

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Airplane Escorts Funeral Procession

The funeral of Lieutenant Philip Henry Farrer, the government airplane tester who lost his life in an air accident in Dayton, Ohio, last Saturday, took place Wednesday morning. Services were held at the home of John J. Farrer, his brother, of No. 494 Birr St., followed by services at the Sacred Heart Church.

As the procession moved from the home to the church two airplanes from Baker Field hurried above it. After the casket was carried into the church one of the planes departed, but the other fluttered over the church, and then followed the procession to Holy Sepulcher Cemetery. As the body was lowered into the grave the airman dropped flowers.

Lieutenant L. S. Parker and Sergeant H. H. Murphy were in charge of a squad of soldiers from the school of Air Photography that was escort to the body. Taps were sounded by L. S. Rohrer and E. V. Lawrence, of the Kodak Park station.

The bearers were privates from the School of Photography: C. Rumer, W. H. Schumacher, N. G. Clark, L. C. Doelman, F. W. Winkler, N. B. Hanes, F. X. LaFleur, S. Urquhart.

At the church solemn requiem high mass was celebrated by Rev. George V. Burns, Rev. Thomas Cornors was deacon, Rev. John B. Sullivan subdeacon.

Rev. Father Burns officiated at the grave, assisted by Rev. Father Sullivan.

JOHN B. O'CONNOR, PH. D.

Death in Washington of Professor Formerly of Rochester.

John B. O'Connor, Ph. D., died in Washington, D. C., Tuesday following an operation. He was well known in Rochester, having taught at St. Andrew's Seminary and the Bradstreet school. He was born in Ireland fifty-four years ago and studied for a time at Trinity College, Dublin. After graduating from the University of Rochester he was admitted to the Monroe county bar, but preferred teaching to the practice of law. He taught Greek and Latin at the Rochester schools until 1905, when he went to the University of Chicago for a post-graduate course. He then went to Princeton for a year.

After a year's study in Greece he went to Adelphi college as an instructor and two years later was called to the Greek chair at the Catholic University in Washington. At the time of his death he was dean of the classical department.

The funeral will be held in Indianapolis where he leaves a wife and two adopted children.

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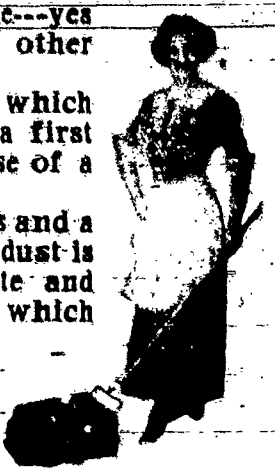
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
