He was 27 years old and left for Camp Dix in April going overseas in June. Private Statmiller was a member of this church. One of Rochester's best known retired business men, Edward McSweeney, passed away on Tuesday evening at his home, No. 51 Prince street. The funeral will be held Friday morning at 9 o'clock from the home and at 9:30 o'clock from St. Mary's Church. The burial will take place in Holy Sepulchre cemetery and will be private.

Mr. McSweeney's name is inseparable from the history of the tobacco industry in this city. His business life extended over a period of nearly half a century. He was born in 1844, in Rochester, and always made this city his home. His first experience as a tobacconist he gained by working out of school hours in a tobacco factory conducted by W. S. Suggett, in Main street directly opposite where the Whitcomb House now is.

For years Mr. McSweeney was interested in the Knights of Columbus and was at one time a grand knight.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Mary McSweeney; three daughters, Mrs. Jane Boon; Laura and Elizabeth McSweeney, and a son, Ambrose McSweeney.

Archbishop Hanna of San Francisco Still At Post.

Reports that Most Rev. Edward J. Hanna, archbishop of San Francisco, is likely to be appointed successor to Cardinal Farley, of New York, are not given much credence by the Catholic clergy in Rochester. It has been said that Archbishop Hanna had left San Francisco for Washington to receive the news of his appointment to the New York see from Mgr. Bonzano, the papal delegate.

In reply to this friends of Archbishop Hanna say that he had planned to make a short visit to his home in Rochester, as he does every year, and had, in fact, got as far east as Helena when he received news of the influenza epidemic in Rochester and throughout the East. He immediately returned to San Francisco, postponing his trip to Rochester to a more favorable time.

Such appointments are under the new regulations, announced from Washington instead of Rome, but no word of the appointment has yet been received by Bishop Hickey or any of his assistants.

Penn Yan, N. Y.

Penn Yan, Oct. 13.—Richard B. McElligott, aged 42 years, who had both legs broken below the knees by the explosion of an automobile tire which he was inflating while in the employ of his brother, John J. McElligott, at his garage in this village, died on last Friday night at St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester, where he was taken after the accident. The death came from pneumonia, which his weakened condition made him unable to withstand. He leaves his wife and one daughter, Eileen; his mother, Mrs. Ellen McElligott, of Rochester; two brothers, Jeremiah E., of Rochester, and John J., of Penn Yan, and one sister, Margaret L., of Rochester.

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Apostolic Delegate to Canada Visits American Foreign Mission Seminary at Maryknoll.

One of the first visits made by His Excellency, the Most Rev. P. Di Maria, Apostolic Delegate to Canada, who recently arrived in New York, was to the American Foreign Mission Seminary at Maryknoll.

The Delegate was accompanied by Archbishop Sinnott of Winnipeg, Monsignor Filippi, secretary to the Delegation, Monsignor Carroll of New York and Father Louis Stickney, Chancellor, of Baltimore.

His Excellency is deeply interested in foreign missions with which he was in intimate relationship for several years as a member of the Sacred Congregation of Propaganda and as Rector of the Propaganda College in Rome. He expressed himself as much gratified with the splendid progress of Maryknoll in which the authorities in Rome are taking a special interest and he emphasized the fact that the Holy Father now looks to America to come to the rescue of the Catholic missions which are so seriously affected by the war.

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
