Interesting Budget of Happenings

St. Peter and Paul.

Our church was closed again on last Sunday on account of the influenza epidemic.

Holy Rosary.

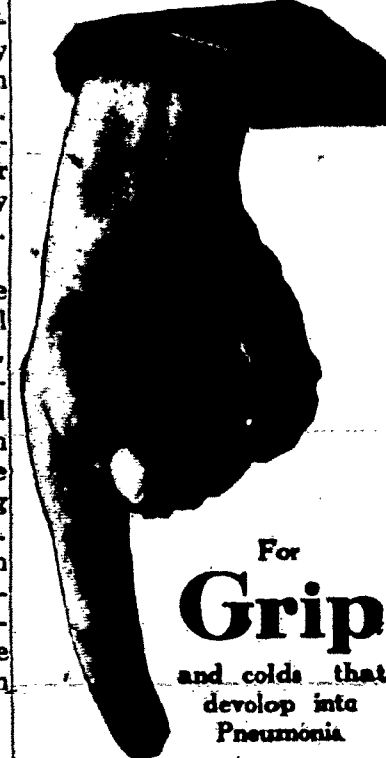
