Parochial Schools To Open Monday.
 Bishop Thomas F. Hickey has made the announcement that the parochial schools of Rochester and the Catholic high schools of the city would not reopen until Monday, November 11th. One of the reasons for the deferred opening of these schools is, in the judgment of the Bishop, a need for rest and building up of the sisters who have been engaged during the enforced suspension of school work in ministering to patients sick with influenza and pneumonia. A large number of sisters have been working in several localities of the diocese and, while in most cases, they have been relieved of the work of nursing within the past few days, they are not in physical condition to take up at once the duties of the school room. Their services have been given in a number of places of the diocese and even now some are in very active service among the sick.
 The Bishop further announces that the official order permitting the churches to be opened will go into effect on Sunday, November 10th, and he takes occasion to remind his people that, while they have been deprived of much consolation, by reason of the closing of the churches, the holy sacrifice of the mass has been regularly offered for them, and priests and nuns have been most loyally with them, not only in prayer, but also in the spiritual and temporal ministrations so faithfully and generously provided for them.
 Executor of Cardinal Farley's Will.
 Bishop Thomas F. Hickey is one of the executors of the will of the late Cardinal Farley of New York. The estate is valued at upwards of \$15,000 and is bequeathed to Bishop Hickey and Auxiliary Bishop Patrick J. Hayes, who will administer the estate until a new archbishop of New York is elected when it will be turned over to him.

SISTER M. FRANCIS BYRNES.
Funeral Held From Nazareth Normal School Tuesday.
 The funeral services of Sister M. Francis Byrnes, who died last Friday from influenza, contracted while acting as nurse for other sufferers at the Emergency hospital in Mount Morris, were held at 9:30 Tuesday morning from Nazareth Normal school. The funeral was private, only the immediate family and sisters from the house being present.
 The celebrant was Rev. George V. Burns of Sacred Heart church, assisted by Rev. Walter Lee of Cornring as deacon and Rev. J. F. O'Hern of the Cathedral as subdeacon, with Rev. Arthur A. Hughes of Holy Rosary acting as master of ceremonies. In the sanctuary were Bishop Thomas F. Hickey, Rev. Dr. A. E. Breen of Mount Morris, Rev. A. A. Notebaert of Our Lady of Victory church, Rev. Alexander McCabe of Holy Cross church, Charlotte, and Rev. Francis Luddy of Sacred Heart Church. Before he pronounced the last blessing Bishop Hickey paid tribute to the life and work of Sister Francis. Burial was made in Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

THE ROCHESTER ORCHESTRA
 Anna Case, the American Soprano.
 Will Sing.
 When Anna Case, the American soprano, sings at Convention-Hall on Monday evening, November 11th, with the Rochester Orchestra, Hermann Dossenbach, conductor, she will be accompanied at the piano by Charles Gilbert Spross, the well known composer. Many of Mr. Spross' most popular songs, notably "Will o' the Wisp" were introduced by Miss Case, and during the coming season she will sing several of his recent compositions, such as "Robin, Robin, Sing Me a Song." Miss Case will make her ninth American tour this season, and before Christmas she will fill some twenty engagements, in the East and middle West.
 Because of the influenza epidemic, the opening concert of the Rochester Orchestra series was postponed, so that the concert on November 11th will be the initial one. Mr. Dossenbach will also present as soloist at that concert Arthur Hartmann, the new concert master of the orchestra, who is a violinist of international reputation. He will play the beautiful Saint-Saens B minor concerto. He has never been heard in Rochester, and his playing, it is anticipated, will arouse great enthusiasm for the art of the latest addition to the city's musical circles.
