Eldest Son of Eugene J. Dwyer Succumbs to Pneumonia.

Eugene Dwyer, Jr., eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene J. Dwyer, died Monday at the family home, No. 3 Burke terrace, of influenza and pneumonia, aged 15 years. He was born on April 21, 1903, received his early education at Nazareth Hall Academy and later attended the Sacred Heart Academy, from which he was graduated in June, 1917. In the fall of that year he entered the Rochester Catholic High School, where his unusual physical prowess and attractive personality soon won him many friends. Although a sophomore, he already had begun to make a name for himself in school athletics, and looked forward eagerly to service in the nation's war forces. He leaves, besides his parents, a sister, Mary Catherine Dwyer, a student in Trinity College, Washington, D. C., and four brothers, Robert T., Thomas Hendrick, William Clark and John Phillip Dwyer, all of this city.

Albany, Nov. 19.--Every boy in New York State, sixteen, seventeen or eighteen years of age, is summoned to enroll for military training under the State Military Law in order that he may legall-

attend school or be employed, by a proclamation issued today by Governor Charles S. Whitman. At the same time the State Military Training Commission, consisting of Brigadier Gen. George A. Dyer, chairman; Dr. George J. Fisher, physical secretary, International Young Men's Christian Association; and Dr. Thomas E. Finegan, deputy state commissioner of education, made public preliminary plans for the enrollment, which will be conducted December 3 by the school teachers of the State at all public schoolhouses.
