### TO LIFT DEBT

People Making a United Effort for St. Bernard's Seminary.

Reports received by Bishop Thomas F. Hickey during the week show that the people of the diocese are taking an active interest in the effort to lift the debt from St. Bernard's Seminary and it is expected that the total amount will be considerably "over the top".

From the Geneva deanery, through Monsignor Joseph W. Henricks, came the report that the little mission of Dundee, where St. Andrew's Church is cared for by the priests of Penn Yan, had subscribed its quota and "paid the money in." This is the second instance of complete cash payments for a parish quota, and that from one of the smallest missions of the diocese.

St. Stephen's Church, of Geneva, of which Rev. Stephen MePadden is rector, had raised its entire quota and the others were reported to be hard at work. Dean Hendrick expects a complete report from the larger churches of his deanery by Sunday.

Rev. J. J. Bloomer, of Elmira reports all churches of his deanery working hard, and St. James' Church, Waverly, of which Rev. James Griffin is pastor, is reported well in the lead toward securing its quota.

Rev. Francis J. Naughten, M. R., of Hornell deanery, reports St. Agnes Church, Avoca, of which Rev. William Daryois pastor, and St. Mary's Church, Bath, of which Rev. Joseph Cameron is pastor, both with full quotas. He also reports that his own church, St. Ann's, at Hornell, will go "over the top" and adds that "the Hornell deanery will have a full quota in every place."

Among the city parishes, Rev. John H. O'Brien, of St. Augustine's Church, reported that judging from the number of replies already received from the members of that parish its quota of \$1,584.50 would be considerably oversubscribed.

### Positions for Men and Women.

Announcement is made by Edward E. Rosenhagen, Rochester secretary for the United States Civil Service Commission, of the need of accountants. The Ordnance Department of the army alone is in need of two hundred senior accountants at entrance salaries from \$2,200 to \$4,200 a year; three hundred junior cost accountants at entrance salaries from \$1,200 to \$2,000 a year, and three hundred clerks qualified in accounting at entrance salaries from \$1,000 to \$1,200 a year. The income tax unit of the Bureau of Internal Revenue is in need of a number of traveling auditors and resident auditors at entrance salaries ranging from \$1,800 to \$4,500 a year.
