ROCHESTER ORCHESTRA.
Eddy Brown, the young American violinist, who will play with the Rochester Orchestra under Hermann Dossenbach at its next concert on Monday, February 17th, in Convention Hall, has won distinct triumphs in three different countries. He made his debut in Berlin, and was given a place by the leading critics there second to none—a fact, however, that did not save him from being mobbed as an American by a crowd of infuriated Berliners after the European war broke out. He crossed to England later, and was received with equal enthusiasm there, and finally he came back to his own country, where he has achieved his greatest triumph. He is a pupil both of Leopold Auer, who has developed several of the greatest violinists of the day, and of the equally great Hubay of the Royal Academy at Budapest. He has thus had the benefit of the very best training that Europe affords, but he retains his unassuming American manner, and he is thoroughly American at heart.
Mr. Dossenbach has seized upon the visit of the American artist as an opportunity for a thoroughly American concert, and has consequently selected for the principal orchestral number the greatest American orchestral work in the "Indian Suite" by MacDowell.
