A requiem mass will be celebrated on Saturday morning for the late Rev. Dr. Sinclair.

St. Joseph's.
Mrs. Anna C. Leicht, wife of George J. Leicht, died Thursday at her home, No. 386 Portland Avenue, after a long illness. Besides her husband, she leaves three daughters, Mrs. William Fingerhuth, of Hartford, Conn.; Elizabeth and Florentine Leicht; three sons, Leo M., Eugene F. and Dr. Frank N. Leicht; one sister, Mrs. Mary M. Sigl, and one brother, Frank M. Hoffman.
The funeral services will be held on Monday morning from the family home and at 9 o'clock from this church, of which she had been a life-long member. Burial will be made in the family lot in Holy Sepulcher cemetery.
Mrs. Leicht was born in Rochester and had lived here all her life. She was a member of the Holy Family, Sacred Heart Altar Society and the St. Joseph's Orphans' Aid Society, all of St. Joseph's Church, and the Rosary Society of St. Francis Xavier Church.

On the feast of the Immaculate Conception, the new members will be enrolled in the Sacred Heart Society. There are 50 new members so far and this will be the largest number to be received at one time.
The funeral of Alphonse Banick, aged 36 years, took place on Tuesday morning from the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Banick, of 60 Maria St., at 9 o'clock and at 9:30 o'clock from this church. Beside his parents he leaves two sisters.

St. Patrick's Cathedral.
Last Monday, the feast of St. Patrick was solemnly observed in St. Patrick's Cathedral. The day had a double significance this year as the observance not only commemorated the feast-day of the patron of the church and diocese, but it also marked the golden jubilee of the mother church of the diocese.
The new cathedral of the newly established diocese of Rochester was under construction when Bishop Bernard J. McQuaid was consecrated as the first Bishop of Rochester on July 12, 1868, and the work of construction was sufficiently advanced for the congregation to move in for the first mass which was celebrated on March 17, 1869. Rev. James M. Early was then pastor of St. Patrick's, and the present structure is the third one erected on this historic spot, which marks the site of the first Catholic church between Utica and Cleveland with a century of existence to its credit. It is planned to celebrate in a formal manner these two events next fall.
The panegyric was preached by Rev. John J. McCreary, S. T. L., of Syracuse.
Vespers on next Sunday will take place at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, to be followed by sermon, Benediction and hymn.
On Tuesday, March 25th, the Right Rev. Edmund F. Gibbons, D. D., a fellow alumnae of the American College at Rome, and pastor of St. Teresa's Church, Buffalo, will be consecrated Bishop of Albany, in the new St. Joseph's Cathedral, Buffalo, N. Y.
As has been customary, beginning with Passion Sunday, April 6th, eight days of spiritual exercises will be held. These exercises will be conducted by the Rev. Francis P. Lyons, a Paulist Father, from St. Paul's College, Washington, D. C.
The sermon on Sunday will be preached by the Rev. Joseph V. Curtin on "Sacramentals in the Church. What and Why Are They?"
The sermon on next Wednesday evening will be preached by Rev. Wm. F. Bergen, on "The Two-Fold Judgment."
