The opening service was at 7:45 o'clock and it is estimated that the largest congregation in the history of the church crowded the edifice.



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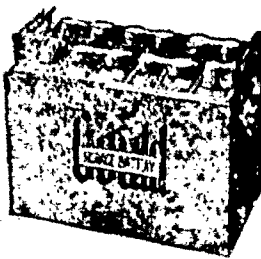
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
