Announcement is made of a series of conferences on Catholic social work to be held in Lady Chapel, Frank St., during Passion Week, April 6th to 13th, under the auspices of the Rochester Catholic Charities Association. The conferences will be conducted by Rev. Francis P. Lyons, a Paulist Father, of Washington, and will be for both men and women.
