Funeral of Sister St. Mark Quinn

Funeral services for Sister St. Mark Quinn, who died last Friday evening in St. Patrick's Convent in Seneca Falls, were held Monday morning at 9:30 o'clock from Nazareth Convent on Jay St., Solemn high mass was celebrated by Rev. M. U. Dwyer of Seneca Falls, assisted by the Rev. M. Miller of Webster, as deacon, and the Rev. William M. Hart of Corpus Christi Church as subdeacon.

Sister St. Mark was born in Rochester October 26, 1865, the daughter of the late John and Mrs. B. Quinn. She received her early education at Immaculate Conception School and completed her academic course at Nazareth Normal School, which she entered in September, 1892. She had taught school at Rochester, Webster, Greece and for the last five years at St. Patrick's School at Seneca Falls.

Sister St. Mark is survived by her mother, and two sisters, the Misses Minnie and Theresa Quinn. Burial was made in Holy Sepulcher Cemetery.

LYMAN H. HOWE'S PICTURES TO BESHOWN AT CONVENTION HALL APRIL 11 & 12th.

One of the astonishing features of Lyman H. Howe's newest Travel Festival program is a sensational series of aviation motion pictures filmed over the city of Washington. Mr. Howe's Travel Festival, now on its forty-ninth semi-annual tour, comes to Convention Hall on April 11 and 12.

The pictures were filmed by members of the aviation division stationed at the capital, a corps which has come to bear the name "the watchdogs of Washington". Not only do the pictures give a splendid idea of the new Washington, with its many recently constructed war buildings, but they possess breathless interest when the bird men begin doing stunts over the city.

These remarkable aviation pictures are but one of the many features of Mr. Howe's latest program. This season audiences are being taken upon a tour of picturesque Japan; a canoe fishing trip into the wilds of Canada; an expedition through Yellowstone National Park; shows how the Italian army trains its ski men in the snow capped Alps; and presented with some thrilling views of a sea elephant hunt in the South Pacific, where, after a terrific six hour fight, a monster specimen of the almost extinct animal is captured alive. Another interesting link in the program is a steamer trip down the mysterious Ocklawaha river, through the cypress glades of Florida. Entirely new animated cartoons and film novelties will be contributed throughout the program by Mr. Howe's artists.

Will Aid Returned Soldiers Regardless of Religion To Obtain Jobs.

William J. Carey, Central and Western New York State field director for the National Catholic War Council, announced Thursday the appointment of Edward K. Rigney, of No. 174 Silver St., as field secretary for the National Catholic War Council in this locality, succeeding Herbert F. McDonnell, who resigned on April 1st to engage in other war activities.

Headquarters of Mr. Rigney will be at the Knights of Columbus rooms in the Triangle building and he will be there every morning from 10 until 1 o'clock to advise with all returning service men regardless of religious affiliation. They may register with him and a record of these registrations will be filed with Mr. Rugg at the United States Employment Bureau. Each afternoon he will canvass the employers in the different districts into which Rochester has been divided and the positions thus obtained will be filled from the list of returned service men.
