City Parish News

Interesting Budget of Happenings Gathered by Our City Reporter

Cathedral.

The masses on next Sunday at the Cathedral will be as usual: 1st mass 6:30, 7:30, 8:30, 9:30 and 10:30 o'clock.

Wednesday evening, May 14th, in Lady Chapel of St. Patrick's Cathedral, a solemn novena in honor of St. Rita of Cascia, opened at 7:45 in connection with May devotions, and will continue to Thursday, May 22, the feast of the saint. A special shrine has been erected for these days, as also one in Cathedral school, the children of which will join in the exercises. Masses will be said each morning at 6, 6:30, 7, 7:30, 8, and 8:30, and confessions will be heard each evening after the services.

St. Rita, an Augustinian nun, was canonized by Pope Leo XIII, in May, 1900, in the great basilica of St. Peter at Rome. On the same occasion, St. DeLaSalle, the founder of the Christian Brothers, was also canonized. This was the last canonization ceremony to take place for the past 19 years until the recent canonization of St. Joan of Arc, which took place last month. St. Rita, who is sometimes called "the saint of the impossible," has many shrines throughout the world, and many devotees, and is perhaps best known of the modern saints.

On next Sunday the ladies' and young girls of the parish will receive Holy Communion, at the 7:30 o'clock mass.

On next Sunday Vespers followed by May devotions, Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament and hymns will take place at 8:30 o'clock.

Every man, woman and child of this parish will be asked to do their "bit" during the month of June, so that the trustees may not have to worry about unpaid bills at the close of June 30th. The entire congregation will be reached by mail.

The boundary of the Cathedral parish is drawn from a point where the canal crosses the Genesee river, north along said river to the Deep Hollow, then west and south along the Deep Hollow

unto the Erie Canal, thence along the canal to Saxton Street, south to Smith Street, thence west to Childs street; thence south to Danforth St.; thence east to York St., thence south to West Ave., and the Erie Canal to the Genesee river.

All Catholics who live within the parish lines have their rights in the Cathedral, unless they choose to belong to one of the other churches and have their pew or sitting in that church.

Catholics living outside the boundary lines given above, cannot be attended from the Cathedral unless they have their pew or sitting in the Cathedral. This regulation holds good in all cases of sick calls, baptisms and marriages.

St. Joseph's.

St. Bridget's.

Special devotions are being held at St. Bridget's church every evening at 8 o'clock in honor of St. Rita. The novena will continue until the evening of May 22, the feast of St. Rita.

The beautiful shrine erected five years ago in honor of the humble Augustinian nun, the first of its kind in the diocese of Rochester, has attracted much attention in the city and St. Bridget's Church is taxed to its capacity each Thursday evening, when special devotions in honor of St. Rita are held. The congregation values very highly a relic of the saint, a small portion of the veil worn by her when a member of the Augustinian community.

St. Rita was born May 22, 1381. She entered the marriage state when quite young. Upon the death of her husband she sought admission to the cloister at Cascia, in the province of Umbria, Italy. She died in 1456, and in 1900 during the pontificate of Leo XIII her name was inscribed on the calendar of the saints to which the Catholic Church pays homage.

During the novena, masses will be said each morning at 7 and 7:45. In connection with the evening services in honor of St. Rita, May devotions will be conducted at the shrine of the Queen of Peace, erected a few months ago when the armistice was signed, as a memorial to the soldiers and sailors of Rochester in the service.
