JUNE ORDINATION'S

The majority of those who complete their studies at the seminary this year have been ordained in their home dioceses, this accounting for the small number that will receive holy orders at the services to be held in the Cathedral on Saturday, June 14th. Those to be ordained here are: Samuel J. Haughton of Hornell, Cornelius J. Hogan of Lima, John F. Neary of Geneva, Francis J. Reilly of Rochester and Daniel R. Sullivan of Auburn, all of the diocese of Rochester.

Arthur G. Cantwell will be ordained in San Francisco by his brother, Bishop Cantwell of Los Angeles, on a date in June to be fixed later. Joseph A. Delany will be ordained in Albany. Twenty-one other members of the class were ordained during last summer or early in the fall, owing to the very pressing need of their various dioceses because of the number of priests who entered the army and navy as chaplains.

The Holy See permitted this shortening of the required four years of theological studies to three which was considered necessary because of the requirements of the war.
