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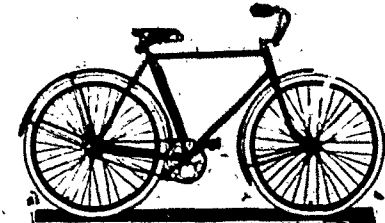
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City Parish News

When it was removed to Industry and assumed an agricultural character he accompanied the institution. He was a brother of Daniel Sharpe, for many years Coroner of Monroe County.

**New Telephone Rates
Effective June 16th**

On May 1st, new local rates, approved by the Postmaster General, were established for the ROCHESTER Central Office District. These rates were temporarily set aside by the Court injunction.

On June 2nd, the Supreme Court of the United States confirmed the authority of the Postmaster General to regulate all telephone rates. New rates became effective Monday, June 16th.
