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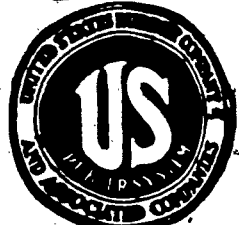

St. Boniface

Chaplain Charles J. Bruton, formerly assistant pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, was given an enthusiastic welcome home after almost a year's service in France by hundreds of friends and parishioners on Monday night. Father Bruton, who held a lieutenant's commission, related his varied war experiences in a speech that lasted over an hour.

Father Bruton sailed for overseas duty July 3, 1918, and was assigned to the zone of the Services of Supplies, where he served as chaplain for two hospitals, each with 5,000 patients, and for Camp Chamiers near Perigueux. He often preached in both French and English, assisting the French priests in their parish work. He also found time to write and publish an interesting descriptive brochure of the old city of Perigueux, which was founded by the Romans and contains many evidences of their occupation.

The Altar Society will play Pedro next Thursday afternoon in St. Andrew's Hall at 2:30 o'clock sharp.

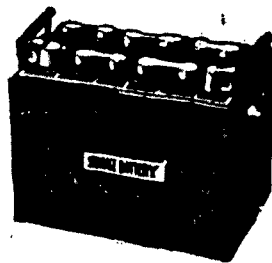

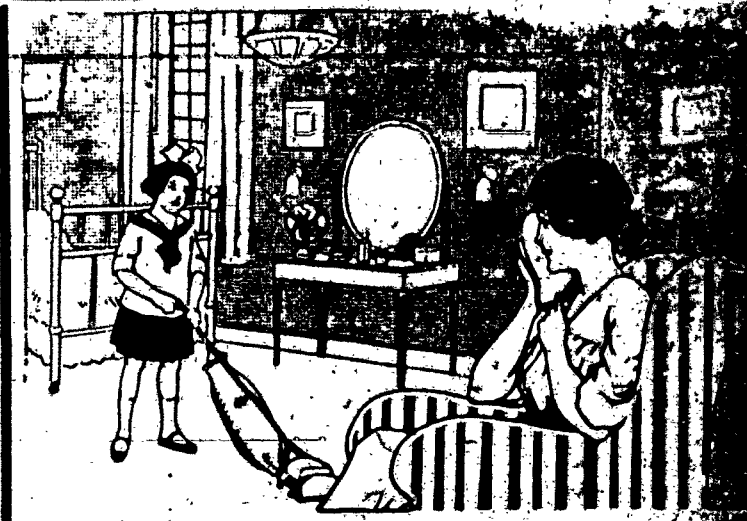
