Bishop Hickey Makes Changes—Transfers Several City Priests.

Bishop Thomas F. Hickey made the following appointments and changes which affect several priests of Rochester: One of the changes is the Rev. William Frank, who has been chaplain at the state and county institutions here for about 15 years and assistant at St. Boniface Church, has been appointed as pastor of St. Januarius' Church in Naples and St. Mathias Church in Atlanta. He will be succeeded here by the Rev. Michael Hynes, who has been in charge of St. Mary's parish in Geneseo during the absence of the Rev. George T. Jones, who entered the country's service as a chaplain.

The Rev. Francis Luddy, assistant pastor in the Church of the Sacred Heart, has been appointed professor in St. Andrew's Seminary to succeed the Rev. Edward B. Simpson.

The Rev. Daniel O'Rourke, assistant pastor of St. Augustine's Church, has been appointed assistant pastor of the Church of the Sacred Heart.

The Rev. Charles F. Shay, who has been assistant chancellor and secretary to the bishop, is appointed assistant pastor of St. Augustine's Church, and the Rev. John M. Sellinger, Ph. B., S. T. B., just returned from service overseas as chaplain, is appointed assistant chancellor and secretary to the bishop, to succeed Father Shay.

GOLDEN JUBILEE OF REV. MOTHER AGNES.

The Superior of the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Diocese of Rochester Completes Fifty Years in the Religious Life—Bishop Hickey Congratulates Jubilarian.

On Saturday morning, August 2, at nine o'clock, the Golden Jubilee of Rev. Mother Agnes Hines was celebrated at Nazareth Convent, the Mother House of the Sisters of St. Joseph in Rochester. The beautiful chapel in which the ceremony took place was adorned with a profusion of palms, ferns, and flowers many of which were the loving tributes of friends.

A Solemn Pontifical Mass was the feature of the occasion, the celebrant, Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D. D., being assisted by the following priests: Arch Deacon, Rt. Rev. Mgr. D. J. Curran, V. G.; Deacons of Honor, Rev. Matthias Hargather and Rev. George Eisler; Sub-deacons, Rev. Michael J. Nolan and Rev. John F. O'Hern; Master of Ceremonies, Rt. Rev. Mgr. Andrew Moehan; assistant Master, Rev. William Bergan.

The Mass, which was sung by the Sisters' choir, was Branchina's Missa in Honorem Sanctae Agatae dedicated to Pope Pius X. The Introitus, the Graduale, the Offertorium and the Communio were rendered in Tozer's chant and the Credo and Te Deum in Gregorian. The Mass was followed by Solemn Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament.

At the conclusion of the ceremonies Bishop Hickey spoke feelingly of the occasion, congratulating the Jubilarian on her fifty years of religious life as a member of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph. In his eloquent sermon the Bishop referred to the life of a nun in its sacrificial character, showing that, though she give all that she is, her gift is as nothing in comparison with what she receives. He compared the convent to the Vestibule of Heaven where the religious lives a life of peace and happiness with the strongest hope of one day entering the abode of eternal bliss. In reviewing the work of the Sisters of St. Joseph in the Diocese of Rochester, the Bishop spoke appreciatingly of the many fields of labor that it covers, but dwelt with special emphasis on the inestimable service rendered to the Church by the Sister teachers in the important work of the religious education of the young. He commended the Sisters for the great work that had been done and was being done in the field of Catholic education in the diocese and he appealed to them to look to Christ as their Model—the great Teacher who went among men teaching positive doctrine. The Bishop expressed his personal apprehension of the consequences to the Church were the Catholic schools to be closed.

Bishop Hickey interpreted the meaning of the day's ceremony as an expression of the respect and esteem of the Bishop, priests and people of the Diocese of Rochester for the Jubilarian, as well as a grateful appreciation of her long years of faithful service. The Bishop then announced that he had received word from Rome that his Holiness Pope Benedict XV had bestowed the papal blessing on Mother Agnes and her community on this occasion of her Golden Jubilee.

After the ceremonies, the Bishop and visiting clergymen were entertained at dinner. In the afternoon a reception and entertainment was given in the auditorium to the Sisters of the Community and visiting religious many of whom came for the occasion from the various sisterhoods of the country. A beautiful poem was written for the occasion by Miss Katherine E. Conway, of Boston, a life long friend of the Jubilarian.

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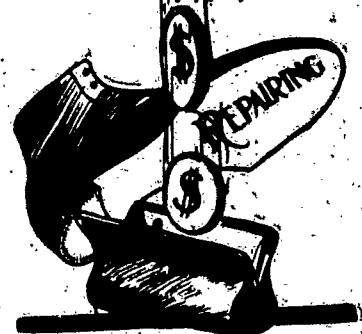
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
