inger and John Streb.

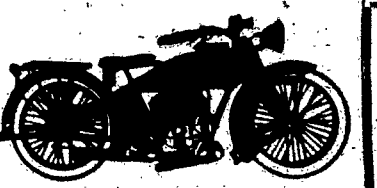
Wednesday evening after ser-
