The Cardinal will arrive at the New York Central Station in a special car at 11:12 o'clock on the morning of Monday, October 13th and will be greeted by the committee composed of Bernard J. Haggarty, Charles Beahan, Arthur E. Sutherland, Dr. Edward Mulligan, Simon Stein, Louis Langie, George T. Roche, William C. Barry, Eugene Dwyer and Frank X. Kelly.

At 11:30—Cardinal arrives at the Church of Our Lady of Victory, Rev. A. A. Notebaert, rector.

12:15—Cardinal arrives at Chamber of Commerce for luncheon and brief address to members of the chamber.

2:00—Cardinal leaves Chamber of Commerce with escort by way of St. Paul street, Main street east, State street and Frank St., for St. Patrick's Cathedral.

2:30—Cardinal arrives at St. Patrick's Cathedral for brief service.

3:30—Cardinal leaves Cathedral for Nazareth Academy opposite Maplewood Park.

3:45—Cardinal arrives at Nazareth Academy to greet sisters of Rochester diocese and women workers of Red Cross.

4:15—Cardinal leaves Nazareth Academy for St. Bernard's Seminary.

4:30—Cardinal arrives St. Bernard's Seminary.

5:30—Cardinal leaves St. Bernard's Seminary for home of Bishop Hickey in East avenue.

8:15—Cardinal leaves home of Bishop Hickey for Convention Hall.

9:30—Cardinal leaves Convention Hall for private car at New York Central station.

Over twenty thousand people visited the graves of relatives and friends at Holy Sepulcher cemetery last Sunday when the annual ceremony of blessing the graves took place.

The procession, headed by cross bearer and acolytes, formed at St. Bernard's Seminary and marched down the boulevard to the chapel, which the clergy entered, while the student bodies, under the direction of Rev. John M. Petter, S. T. B., sang vespers for the dead in the areaway outside. Bishop Hickey was assisted by Rt. Rev. Mgr. J. J. Hartley, president of the seminary, and Rev. Mathias J. Hargather, of St. Michael's Church. After the procession through the cemetery grounds the Bishop spoke in part as follows:

"The simple ceremony in which we have participated to-day, and which describes for us the mystery of living faith, firm hope and deep charity, should not fail to convey a most important lesson. It is nearly one-half a century now since bishop, clergy and faithful first came to this consecrated spot to perform this ceremony for the departed ones, so many thousands of whom now lie buried here. The lesson is not a new one, but rather the old story of the sentence of death pronounced upon man from the beginning, and to-day in love and charity we offer up the beautiful prayers of the church for those whose bodies lie here, but whose souls are in their eternal home.

"In the past twelve months, more than two thousand have been added to the population of many thousands who already were buried here, and when you come to visit and to pay your last respects to your beloved dead you are comforted by the words of Mother Church appealing for mercy on their souls. Indeed, this life has its deep and heavy shadows and at times they would seem almost more than human nature could bear, but the cross of Christ, in the midst of it all, looms up with faith and hope and love to enable us to bear it. No genius on earth, no power, no riches, or greatness, could lift the burden from poor human nature, unless religion with its powerful helps stepped in to succor us in the hour of trial.

At Saloniki.



The veritable mountains of relief supplies turned out by the millions of chapter workers during the war made the American Red Cross one of the biggest "manufacturing concerns" in the world, with great warehouse space at scores of strategic points all around the globe.

One of the biggest distribution centers was at Saloniki, Greece, and in this picture Bulgarian prisoners of war are seen there unloading a Red Cross cargo of 2,300 boxes from a French transport. At the right is seen one of the American Red Cross camions, fleets of which were used in rushing relief to points where the suffering was greatest.

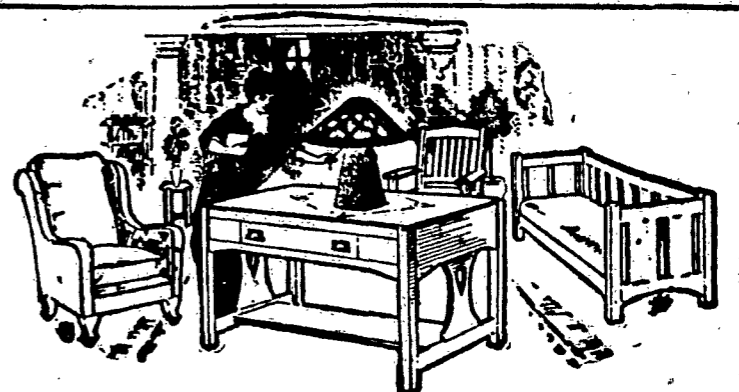
