Interesting Budget of Happenings
Gathered by Our City Reporter
Cathedral.

The first weekly meeting of the jubilee workers was held in the Cathedral rectory Wednesday night for returns on the Jubilee Fund campaign of \$25,000 which has been inaugurated as a part of the program for "Century Week." Only a dozen of the score or more solicitors were ready for a report, but when the roll call was finished, the grand total amount close to \$2,000, or a little less than one-twelfth of the goal.

The highest returns were made by Mrs. Margaret Norman, of No. 273 Sherwood avenue, whose footing amounted to \$715. The others ranged as follows: Rev. J. Francis O'Hern, \$410; Mrs. P. C. Downs, No. 81 Frank street, \$101; Daniel Regan, No. 61-2 Madison Park north, \$126; Miss Lois E. Tracy, No. 41 Albemarle street, \$85; William E. Lurz, No. 7 Terry street, \$87; Mrs. James O'Sullivan, No. 181 Saratoga avenue, \$68; Mrs. Claude Roosevelt, No. 201-2 Lorimer street, \$53.50; Miss Helen M. Sickmond, No. 557 Smith street, \$25; Miss Catherine O'Brien, No. 111 Lorimer street, \$24.50.

The total to date in cash and pledges is \$1,760. Of this amount the largest subscription was one of \$200, although several of \$500 are expected and a great many of \$100, as it is the suggestion of the committee that as many pledges in preparation of the first Friday as possible of \$100 should be made to carry out the "centennial" idea. In fact the slogan of the workers is "make it at least one hundred."

The special Committee on Finance met at the same time with James G. Comerford, chairman, presiding. The committee reserved its report on the best prospects till the next meeting, which will be held on next Wednesday night November 5th, at the rectory. James P. B. Duffy, speaking in behalf of the trustees at the close of the meeting, said: "Our Jubilee workers have made a splendid start, and everything points to a most successful campaign. The public at large appreciates what Catholicity has meant for Rochester for the past one hundred years, and stands ready to honor the centennial celebration which will furnish an occasion to crystallize as it were the sentiments of appreciation for the splendid work done by the pioneers especially, as well as by the present generation, for religion and morality, for education and citizenship, for law and order. I bespeak a generous and hearty welcome for our Jubilee workers from the Rochester public."

Holy Rosary.

"We welcome you young men who went forth to fight for your country; we are proud of you, and we rejoice that you have returned safely. You did your duty as good Americans," said Rev. Frank W. Mason of Geneva last Sunday night in a sermon preceding the dedication, at Holy Rosary church, of the memorial window for those who served during the war.

After Father Mason's sermon, the beautiful stained glass window placed in the west side of the church was unveiled. The solemn dedication was given by Rev. John J. Ganey, with Rev. John W. Crowley as deacon and Rev. William Cassidy as subdeacon. They were assisted by Rev. Charles Bruton. All of the priests who took part in the dedication of the window were chaplains who saw active service overseas.
