Interesting Budget of Happenings Gathered by Our City Reporter

Cathedral.

At the second of the weekly meetings of the jubilee workers of St. Patrick's Cathedral held on Wednesday evening at Cathedral rectory reports were received from twenty solicitors on the campaign for a \$25,000 fund which it is hoped to raise between now and Thanksgiving week. This report is only a partial one as many of the solicitors held back returns for another week, and others were unable to be present at the meeting.

Great enthusiasm prevailed when James G. Comerford, acting chairman, announced a total of subscriptions for the week amounting to \$2,005.66, the \$2,000 mark which the committee had set for itself for the past eight days having been reached. Wednesday night's total, added to the amount reported at the last meeting, made a grand total to date of \$3,654.56. The report of the special Finance Committee, which is looking after the big donations, will be made on next Wednesday night, at the next meeting of the workers.

At the close of the meeting the trustees and everyone interested expressed themselves as being fully satisfied with the progress of the campaign, which has three weeks still to run, with one-seventh of the fund already raised, and the majority of the assignment cards yet to be heard from.

The historical data of the 100 years of existence of the parish, which will be issued on Sunday, November 23d, went to press this week, and the committee on exhibit asks that any pictures or printed matter of historic interest possessed by any of the earlier families as an heirloom, would be sent to the Cathedral rectory, No. 70 Frank street, where it will be listed.
