Charities Aid Association Meet.

At the annual meeting of the trustees of the Rochester Catholic Charities Aid Association, held in the Hotel Rochester on Tuesday evening, Bishop Thomas F. Hickey, the president, presided, and at the close of the dinner read a summary of the work accomplished since its organization and outlined some future policies.

He spoke of the splendid work done by this organization in supervising and financing Catholic charities, the work and scope of which have grown rapidly in the last three years. He showed the various channels into which monies collected had been distributed and praised the Community Chest which is solving the financial question of all these institutions and agencies in a manner which meets with the warmest approval.

He spoke of the latest agency in Catholic welfare work, the Anna Wilkin Home in Fulton avenue where mothering-care is being given to dependent and orphaned babies. He spoke also of the plans under way for dividing the city into four districts in each of which a trained social worker would have responsible authority and would have associated with her a corps of volunteer workers.

William T. Nolan, general secretary of the association, read a report which reviewed the accomplishments of the organization in its supervisory and purchasing department in behalf of the Catholic charities of the city and diocese.

Rev. A. M. O'Neil, M. R., told the gathering of the importance of genuine social welfare work.

Chief of Police Joseph M. Quigley, who is a trustee of the association, told of the important social service work which the Police Department of Rochester is doing.
