### CHURCH NEWS

S. S. Peter and Pauls.

School collection will be taken up at all the masses on Sunday.

Sunday will be communion day for all the young ladies of the parish. The members of the Sodality will receive in a body at the 8:15 o'clock mass.

The regular meeting of the Young Ladies' Sodality will be held on Monday evening. Stereopticon views of Rome will be shown at the meeting by Rev. J. E. Gefell.

St. Michael's.

The masses on Sunday will be as follows: 6:45, 7:45, 9:15 (children's mass) and 10:30 o'clock (high mass.)

Sunday morning at the 7:45 o'clock mass the members of the Ladies' Sodality will receive Holy Communion in a body.

Friday being the feast of St. Joseph high mass was celebrated at 8 o'clock.

Sunday at all the masses the extra collection will be taken up for the new improvements in the church.

A farewell reception was given on last Sunday evening in honor of Rev. Father George F. Staub at his home, 342 Avenue A., who left Rochester to take up his work as director of the American Foreign Missions on the Pacific Coast. Father Staub went to New York City, where he had an interview with the Archbishop of Tokyo, who was visiting the Metropolis and then will start across the continent to make his headquarters in Los Angeles. Father Staub is the first Rochester priest to enter the foreign missionary field and within three years he expects to sail for Japan.

In Los Angeles Father Staub will open a school for Japanese children, with ten teaching nuns on the staff, seven of whom are Japanese. He has specialized in the Japanese language but his work besides directing the missionary activities will include further study of the language and customs of Japan.

The young priest took his preparatory course in St. Andrew's Seminary this city and studied the philosophy and theology at St. Bernard's Seminary, later receiving permission from Bishop Hickey to take the special foreign missionary course at Maryknoll Seminary at Ossining, N. Y. He was ordained last June by Archbishop Hayes of New York.

Before leaving for New York Sunday evening, Father Staub said that he would devote the next three years to further study of the Japanese language and people in preparation for the opening of the American mission in Japan. In his field in California were about 60,000 Japanese and that the seven Japanese nuns who would assist him in the school-work were from Nagasaki. The order of missionaries already have a house in San Francisco and Father Staub said he would open a school in Seattle in September.

Seven of his colleagues are doing missionary work in China with headquarters at YungKong. Recently the Vatican requested the American Foreign Missions to undertake evangelization work in Japan. The religious Society was organized eight years ago and now has twenty-five priests, fifteen lay brothers and fifty nuns. Preparations are under way
