Prohibition

More and more, despite what William H. Anderson and the Anti-Saloon League may say or do to the contrary, it becomes apparent that prohibition or rather how the Prohibition amendment to the Federal Constitution is to be enforced, is to be a red-hot issue in the coming presidential, Congressional and State elections of 1920.

All over the country comes the report that the wets and drys are to "quiz" candidates as to how they stand on this particular issue. It is admitted that there is no likelihood that strong liquors will ever be again authorized to be sold unrestrictedly or that the saloon will return as it used to be, but that there is a strong and growing sentiment that unless light wines and beers are permitted to the people and the intolerant enforcement of the Federal prohibition law is not moderated, there will be trouble in this country. Cardinal Gibbons surely will not be charged with friendship for the distillers or brewers. No man in the United States is or has been a more staunch advocate of temperance than his Eminence yet he advises that light wines and beers of non-intoxicating content should be permitted to the people. Doubtless he has been led to this declaration by the intolerant attitude of the anti-saloon leaguers who are crying aloud that the ordinary housewives must not be permitted to make her time-honored grape and elderberry brews or to flavor her puddings, pies and jellies with anything that savors of wine or cider. And it may be that the Cardinal has been convinced by Wayne Wheelers admission to the New Jersey senate committee that sacramental wine can be barred under the Federal prohibition amendment "but I do not think it advisable or wise to go so far."

There is evident everywhere a stern purpose on the part of the people to check the wane of puritanical intolerance that was fanned to fierce flame by the antipathies and animosities engendered by the great war.

A Strong Lever

"The passion for profit is the strong lever that raises the cost of living" says the "Cleveland Universe". The consumer is the victim of a national contempt for small returns and slow success. He cannot consistently complain because he adopts identically the same methods when his turn comes to apply the screws. All classes and conditions are infected with the get-rich-quick fever. Is it any wonder that prices of foodstuffs are inordinate when every one who handles them, from the farmer to the last retailer, insists on a profit out of all proportion to what he has a right to demand.
