**FUNERAL OF SISTER SYLVIA**

The funeral of Sister M. Sylvia Quinn was held from the chapel of St. Patrick's Orphanage at 9 o'clock Monday morning. A solemn requiem mass was celebrated by Rev. J. B. Crowley, of Rochester, assisted by Rev. P. J. McArdle, of Scottsville, deacon, and Rev. Edward Meagher of St. Bernard's Seminary, sub-deacon. Rev. E. A. Rawlinson, chaplain of the orphanage, was master of ceremonies. The convent choir of Nazareth Normal School sang the mass.

Besides the sisters and children of the home, friends and relatives of the deceased, and members of the sisterhood from the various convents of the city were present.

Sister Sylvia laid down a life still in its prime, which had been devoted for many years, since her early entrance into the order, to the service of Christ in the persons of His needy little ones. She was known as a noble, self-sacrificing exponent of the ideals that inspire the Christian teacher.

In the institution where she labored, her personality wielded a strong, quiet influence which will be greatly missed, both by her associates, and the young girls on whom she brought to bear all the resources of a splendid womanly nature and an utterly devoted soul. The results of her teaching and example will be coextensive with the lives of those whose good fortune it has been to come within the scope of her influence. Her loss is mourned by many devoted friends.

**ANTHONY J. RYAN DEAD**

Anthony J. Ryan, a prominent undertaker of Rochester and a member of the firm of Ryan & McIntee, of No. 196 Main street west, died at 10:30 o'clock Monday night at his home, No. 50 Hobart street, after an illness of eight weeks.

Mr. Ryan was born in Sodus forty-nine years ago. When he was 20 years old he came to Rochester and began to learn the undertaking business. About fourteen years ago he formed a partnership with E. Leo McIntee and has conducted the business in Main street west since then.

Mr. Ryan was well known throughout the city and he leaves a host of friends. He was a member of the Knights of Columbus, the Holy Name Society of St. Augustine's Church, the Rochester Undertakers' Association, Woodmen of the World and the C. R. & B. A.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Anna I. Ryan; two sons, Joseph E. and Walter A. Ryan, and a sister, Mrs. D. C. Field, of Toledo.

The funeral took place Friday morning at 9 o'clock from the house and at 9:30 o'clock from St. Augustine's Church. Interment in Holy Sepulcher cemetery.

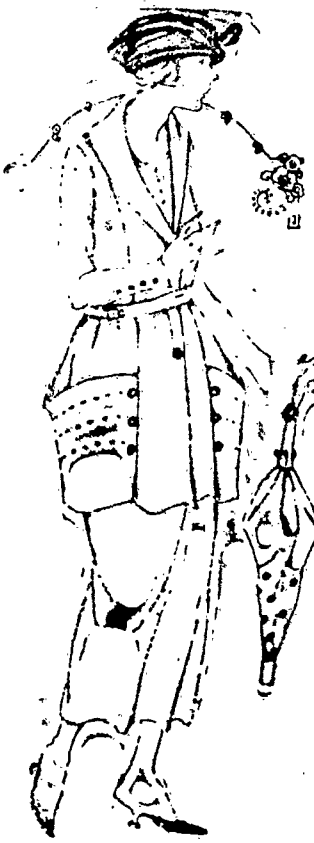

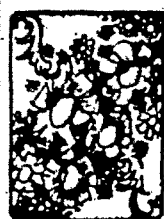

**HAIL EASTER MORNING**

Remarkable Service Annually Attracts Thousands to Riverside, Cal.



A rockhewn amphitheater, capable of seating 20,000, has been built on the crest of Mt. Rubidoux, near Riverside, Cal., where each Easter morning for ten years the rising sun has been greeted by an annually increasing body of worshippers, numbering last year nearly 25,000. The outdoor auditorium is so constructed as to make the most of the natural beauties of the region, and will be used only for religious services, such as the sunrise commemoration of Easter, which has made the mountain famous.

The first of these services, the program of which is almost invariable from year to year, was held in 1909 at the invitation of Jacob Riis, who visited Riverside every year until he died, and who saw a great spiritual inspiration for the community in an Easter sunrise, viewed by a large number of persons in connection with religious thought. At the first service only about 100 were present, says an exchange. That service began, as have all succeeding ones, with the playing of "The Holy City" as a concert solo. A huge cross was erected to catch the first glint of the rising sun.

In 1911 the program was enlarged to practically its present form. Beginning that year the reading of Henry Van Dyke's poem, "God of the Open Air," became a permanent feature. In 1913 Dr. Van Dyke read the poem himself. Similar services in a smaller way have become numerous throughout the country but there is an impressive solemnity which makes the Mt. Rubidoux event distinctive. The new amphitheater is looked on by leaders in the movement as a powerful force in bringing thousands of pilgrims from other states for the unique commemoration.

**Message of the Empty Tomb.**

The Easter message is the message of the empty tomb. It is the message of the new life, higher and purposeful. Do we need it? Never in all history such an outreaching faith. In the vision of this higher life, in the assurance of this unbroken immortal life where the great father-God is ever true to the ideals of righteousness, and love, men can stand with sure tread, though the red tides surge around them, and contend for human liberty.

We couple the Easter message with the empty tomb and the angel's message, "He is not here. He is risen, as he said."
