Mrs. Mary Wood Lawton

In the death of Mrs. Mary Wood Lawton, late of Honeoye Falls, ended the life of a pioneer Christian woman who saw the growth of Western New York.

Mrs. Lawton was born in 1840 the daughter of Robert and Ann Wood in the town of Mendon. At sixteen she was a teacher in her district; but her taste for home life and domestic only was too strong to allow her to continue in the work of the school-room. Her father enlisted in the Civil War leaving his wife and seven children to follow the call of his country.

In 1861 she was married to the late Michael Lawton, Jr. One daughter, Mrs. John Fitzgerald of Honeoye Falls, with whom she has made her home, a grandson and a granddaughter, Raymond and Agnes Fitzgerald survive to mourn her loss.

Friends and acquaintances marvelled at Mrs. Lawton's wonderful vitality, which enabled her to follow a gentle routine of household duty till close to the end. The evenness and serenity of her disposition, coupled with regular daily duties account in part for her splendid endurance; but a life of faith and prayer carried Mrs. Lawton along the road that less favored souls find hard to travel. She seemed buoyed up by that unflinching trust in God characteristic of the days of our pioneer ancestors.

At the obsequies solemn high mass of requiem was celebrated by Rev. Martin Cluney assisted by Reverend Fathers Neville of Bloomfield and Farrel of Lima. Interment took place in St. Rose's cemetery, Lima, N. Y.
