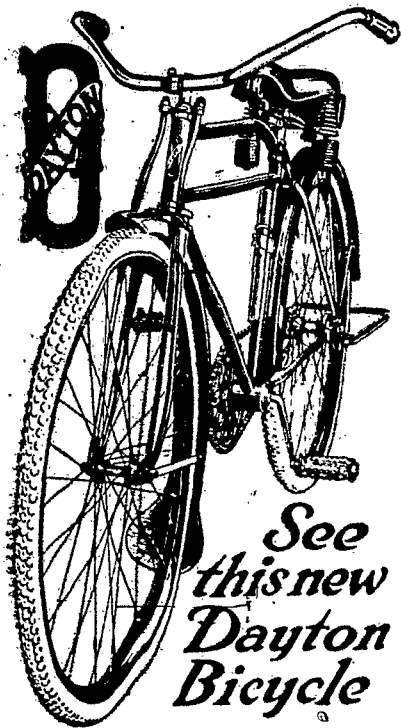

**HARRINGTON MEMORIALS**

**Impressions Intended To Convey Thoughts of Love and Faith.**

Ithaca, N. Y., May 15.—Rector William H. Harrington, M. R., of Ithaca, does some things that will survive him on earth after he has joined his fathers. Soon after being sent to Ithaca, years ago, he erected a beautiful and artistic memorial over the ashes of Father Philip Lynch, one of his universally beloved predecessors, who died in 1879, and was buried in the older Catholic cemetery, Mt. Olivet. About two years ago the rector erected in the new Catholic (Calvary) cemetery, at his own expense, a costly and magnificent life sized group of the Savior upon the cross, and His mother, the Virgin Mary, and Joseph and Mary Magdalene, in heart-breaking sorrow, at the foot or base of the cross, and all sculptured by master hands from a huge block of the purest Italian marble, a memorial worthy of the rector of the parish of this city and this county.

Rector Harrington was so pleased, several months ago, with the painting by his parishioner, Miss Mary G. McCormick, of the immortal strategist and soldier, Field Marshal Foch, before an altar in a church, during a terrific cannonading in France in 1918, while on his knees in prayer, unattended and alone, and unseen by any one but a straggler with an arm in a sling, an American soldier from California, that the rector took it to New York. He returned with it with a massive gold frame and hung it in the library of his parish school, an object lesson upon the dignity and efficacy of prayer for the present and future generations who shall attend or visit that school. It is a grand companion piece for the popular painting, "Washington kneeling in the snow and praying at Valley Forge." Rector Harrington's last public act in that line is an order for a memorial described partly as follows:

A large bronze figure of the angel Gabriel, wings spread out to the wind, holding a long trumpet to his lips, calling the human family, the dead, to judgment; head erect and giving wonderful expression to the whole figure. It stands on a grand marble base of three pieces. The inscription on a bronze tablet affixed to the top base piece, reads, "1917-1918. In memory of the heroes who served in the world war from Immaculate Conception parish of Ithaca, N. Y. Corporal Michael F. Conway, Corporal James B. Henighen, Private Harry Lovell, who died in service, and the 273 other boys who returned with honor. Erected by the parishioners, July 5, 1920." That is the date fixed for its dedication. It was made in Rome, Italy, by distinguished artists. The soldiers' memorial is probably finished and packed and shipped to Ithaca.

The pride in art, love of art, Americanism, cultivation and initiative of this priest are reflected in these memorials. They inspire us with thoughts of God and country, religion and liberty, purity and patriotism. Rector Harrington's ideals. He teaches them in a manner most likely to uplift his fellow mortals to understand them. While others in Ithaca and elsewhere talk about erecting memorials, Rector Harrington erects them for his own flock. He strikes while the irons of duty, gratitude and memory are hot.

Rector Harrington cites as an illustration of the patriotism of his parish the fact that the only Ithaca boys who enlisted and served under the Stars and Stripes during our war with Spain, in 1898-99, and died in the service, three members of his congregation, one of them a native of Ireland. Their bodies were brought to Ithaca and buried from that church with military honors, their caskets wrapped in the folds of Old Glory.

**These ideals of Rector Harrington, dean of our Ithaca clergy, were made complete while studying for the priesthood in Rome, the eternal city, in the lingering atmosphere and prayers of the martyrs and saints of the ancient colosseum, in the blaze and glory of the art and grandeur of St. Peter's, in the highways trod by Caesar, Cicero and Virgil, the philosophy and psychology of his mother church, in the eternal city where he celebrated his first mass upon an altar over the tomb of St. Peter, the city that was once the capital of the world and is now the center of the church of 400,000,000 of intelligent Christians, and is conducted on a plane of dignity that surpasses the palmy days of early Roman emperors.**

Such a citizen, such a priest in our city is an inspiration, but while erecting such classic memorials to the memory of others, he is unconsciously erecting better, perhaps, than he knows, beautiful monuments to his own name and memory. — Elmira Telegram.

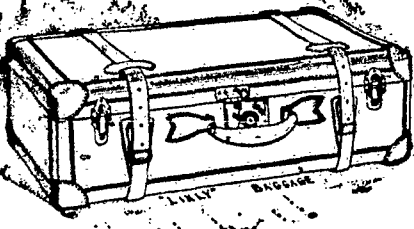

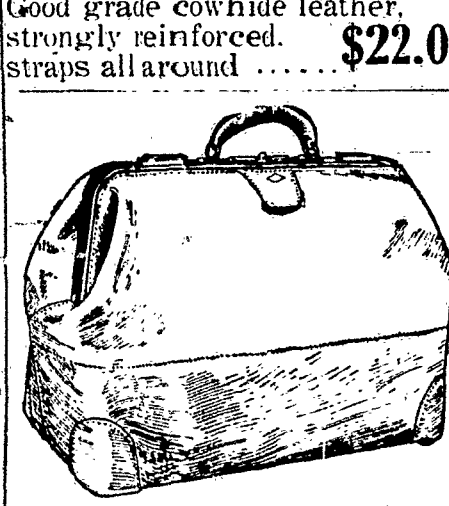

**CESS TO CHAT AND SMOKE AT FACTORY**

New Scheme Put in Effect to Increase Production of Footwear.

Smoking and chatting periods have been introduced at a shoe factory at Marlboro, Mass., in an effort to increase efficiency. Several ideas eliminating unnecessary processes have been adopted and other suggestions aimed at time saving are being tried out.

Some of the operatives, it is said, did not take kindly to the experiments and were wondering dubiously what the next attempt of the management would be. It came in unexpected form and the employees are now discussing that latest idea over their pipes and their knitting "on the company's time."

The speculation over the next efficiency plan was answered by the following announcement: "Production must be increased. Quality must be improved. Beginning tomorrow, operations will be suspended twice daily to allow operatives to rest."

During these periods, which begin at 10 in the morning and 3 in the afternoon, the power of the plant is shut off and the wheels are stopped while the men smoke and the women chat or knit. Then the whirr of the machinery begins again and the workers return to their task of making shoes.

Home Distilling Comes High. John Getten pleaded guilty the other day in federal court to operating a still on his farm near Youngstown, O. "Fine of \$200," Judge Killits said. "And 40 days in Canton workhouse," he added a moment later. "That's enough," Getten said sadly. As he turned away a member of the revenue collector's staff accosted him. "And \$1,000 surtax for not paying an assessment for making liquor," Getten was told.
