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Simply a matter of getting ready the food to be cooked and placing it in the cooker. Go away and leave it as long as you like. It can't burn and if you are gone for two or three hours or more you will know that your dinner is thoroughly cooked and waiting for you when you return.

Orphan Asylum On Fire

St. Patrick's Girls' Orphan Asylum on Clifton street was damaged by fire on Wednesday evening estimated at between \$35,000 and \$40,000 before the flames had been extinguished. Spontaneous combustion is held responsible for the fire which was discovered shortly after 8 o'clock by Michael Greco, a 12-year-old inmate of St. Mary's Boys' Orphan Asylum. He saw flames issuing from a cupola at the northwest corner of the Clifton street building, shouted a warning and then hastened to the Genesee street firehouse.

While the fire was confined to the attic in which it apparently started, water in great quantities ran down below and caused heavy damage, particularly to the St. Mary's, St. Vincent's and Holy Angels' dormitories and the chapel, from which the sacred vessels were carried by Chaplain Edmund Rawlinson, who was thoroughly drenched while engaged in the work of rescue.

Bishop Thomas F. Hickey was one of the early arrivals at the fire and directed the work of providing temporary quarters for the children, a task in which he was assisted by various priests. The Joseph M. Schantz Storage Company, Hotel Rochester and the Powers Hotel sent quantities of bedding to replace that damaged by fire and water, donations which Bishop Hickey was quick to return thanks for as well as to scores of offers of temporary accommodation for the children.

Insurance will cover the loss from fire and steps will be taken to make immediate repairs. The building was recently inspected by the State Board of Charities and found in Class A condition.

St. Bernard's Students Sing In New York

Seventy-five students of St. Bernard's Seminary gave a remarkable exhibition at the opening of the International Congress of Gregorian Chant in St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City Tuesday.

Among the patrons of the congress are Bishop Thomas F. Hickey of Rochester, and Archbishop Edward J. Hanna of San Francisco, formerly of Rochester. Many Rochester laymen and prominent Catholic laymen of Rochester were present.
