(Continued from 1st page) ly all the Morals Committee's efforts for clean conditions in St. Louis.

The Committee has not restricted its activities merely to the theater and the picture show. It has done much to prevent the circulation of immoral pictures and publications, to remove improper displays from drug stores, to "cleanse" commercial advertising, to inspect and reform dance halls and to correct many other evils.

In a large number of instances, a report of the organization shows, complaints of impropriety and positive indecency in theatrical and like performances resulted in corrections by the management.

Chairman Schneiderhahn is now attempting to bring about an interstate organization which would co-operate in the exchange of information and actual assistance to purify the stage and the "movie." It is Mr. Schneiderhahn's idea that if reprehensible features in plays originating in New York could not be eliminated by the New York branch of this organization the branches in other sections of the country could continue the endeavor as the production appeared in their respective communities.

Orleans County Has Dreams of Becoming Oil District

Albion, April 1.—Albion residents are interested in the prospect of obtaining a supply of natural gas and oil from veins two miles northeast of this village, where for some time oil has been known to exist.

Experts of the Standard Oil Company and several independent oil companies have visited the farms of Roy Crandall and D. G. Hobby and secured samples of the oil which during the wet seasons floats on the water in the ditches on the farms.

Soil tests have also been made and from the results obtained it is believed the central part of Orleans county may soon become an oil producing district, and local residents will have a natural gas supply just outside the county seat village.

The new company is known as the Central Orleans Gas and Oil Company, capitalized at \$10,000.

Before this item appeared we had our well down, which is producing one million feet of gas per day. This gas will condense approximately 5 gallons of gasoline to every 1,000 feet of gas at the present market proof or 3 1/2 gallons 96% proof and still leave a better gas for fuel.

STOCK RAISING IN PARAGUAY

Look to South America to Cut Cost of Meat.

STEER FATTENED FOR \$1.60

Abundance of Grazing Land and Improved Breeding Point to Boom in Industry in Paraguay—W. A. Reid of the Pan-American Union. After Survey, Says Country Only Lacks Capital—Future Prospects Bright.

The low price at which beef can be obtained in Paraguay is due to the abundance of grazing land and improved breeding in Paraguay, point to a bright future in cattle raising in that country.

In Paraguay the fattened steer suitable for market on the average is nearly five years old. About eight acres of land are required to support one steer. At a land cost of 40 cents an acre, the interest at 7 per cent is slightly more than 4 cents a year; and allowing eight acres a head about 334 cents a year, or a total of \$1.60, is the interest on land which produces a steer ready for slaughtering.

Capital is Needed. The reason this country, comprising 196,000 square miles in the heart of South America, has been backward in developing its two principal industries—stock raising and quebracho exploitation—is attributed, not to the lack of rich grazing pastures or to the scarcity of timber lands, but to the need for capital for their development.

ly heavy rains, and although most and rolling uplands lay near, lack of human direction and foresight resulted in the loss of vast numbers of fine beef cattle.

"Such conditions, however, are not likely to continue today, for the demand for meat products has quickened the activities of stockmen the world over, and skilled cattle raisers have sought newer fields, where suitable and natural conditions will enable them to develop their industry, and in their search they have gone to hitherto undeveloped regions.

"Few, if any countries furnish a better illustration of this statement than Paraguay. The scarcity of population, estimated at 1,000,000 persons, is far below what might be maintained, is one of the conditions that tend to draw outside capital, tempting the great corporation with its various activities to develop virgin fields. Foreign corporations are now in sufficient number to make themselves felt commercially, and the fact that the newer communities are progressing, if not already returning dividends, speaks well for future prospects.

Decline in United States. "Today the vast pastures of Argentina are furnishing more beef for foreign consumption than do the plains of our Golden West; in the United States the growing of cattle is declining year by year, the farmer, the mechanic, the miner, taking the place of the romantic cowboy, and cereal crops being grown where the lowing herds once grazed. In other words, the last two decades have seen a decrease in certain western cattle lands of over half billion acres.

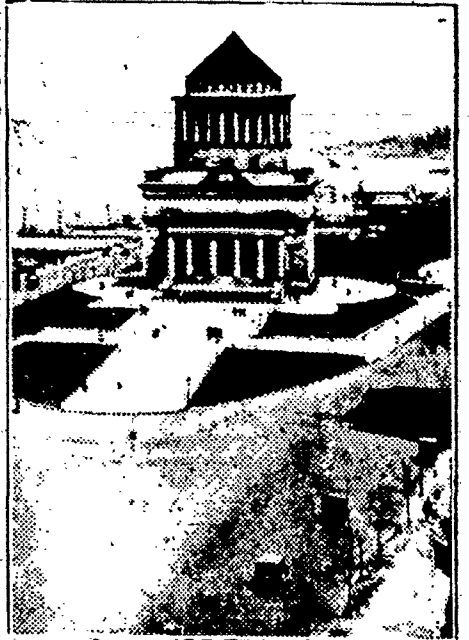
To use another comparison and quoting from a report of the federal trade commission, it is shown that while our population (from 1880 to 1910) increased more than 83 per cent, the production of beef cattle grew only 22 per cent. From 1910 to 1919 the United States population increased about 14 per cent, while the number of cattle decreased about 10 per cent.

One United States company which entered Paraguay several years ago, and whose property now includes millions of acres of lands, one tract alone, locally known as Pinasco, comprising 1,250,000 acres, is actively engaged in meat canning and packing. Slaughter houses and plants, operated at convenient places on the Paraguay river, are

capable of handling 3,000 head or cattle a week.
