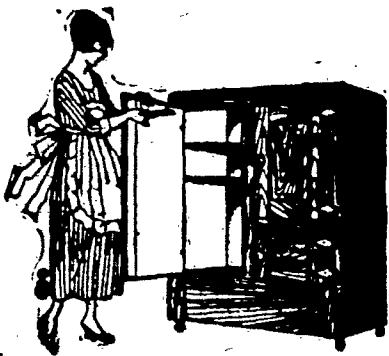

street.

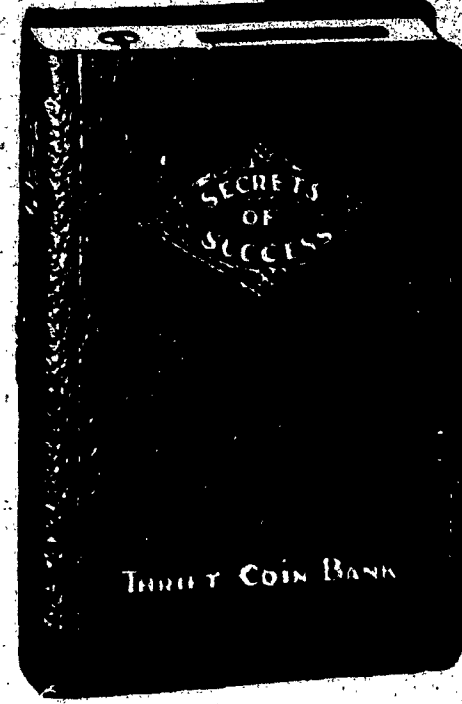
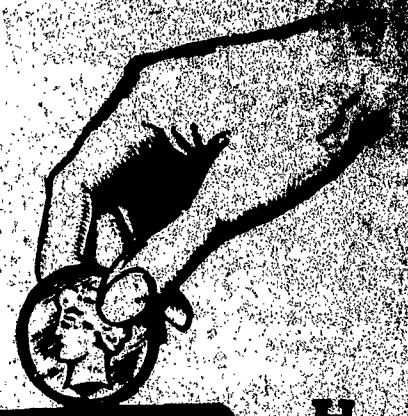
